DISTRIBUTION OF BOARS IS PROVING A POPULAR POLICY.

Good Progress is Being Made in Ontario and This Article Contains Some Information Necessary for Success.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

One hundred and fifty pure-bred boars of bacon type have been doing their share to push Ontario over the top as a bacon producing province. These boars have bred during the past year over 7,500 sows, and the progeny are now being marketed.

The age at which a young boar may be first used depends largely upon his development. Some boars may be used to a few weeks when not more than seven months old without apparent injury.

Probably nothing is more essential to the health and vigor of an animal than exercise. In summer it is usually a comparatively simple matter to provide exercise in a paddock or pasture lot, but in winter it is difficult.

It requires good judgment to keep a boar in the best possible condition. Extremes are to be avoided. The over-fat boar does not make a satisfactory sire as a rule, and a half-starved boar cannot transmit vigor to his progeny.

Supplemental Feeds. But a boar needs something besides grain and meal to be in his best condition. Skim milk and buttermilk are excellent, and will give good results with meal, even if nothing else is used.
