
There is only one way to kill all the Flies

Wilson's Fly Pads

This is it—Darken the room as much as possible. Close the windows, raise one of the blinds where the sun shines in, about eight inches, place as many Wilson's Fly Pads as possible on the place (properly wetted with water but not flooded) on the window ledge where the light is strong. Leave the room closed for two or three hours; then sweep up the flies and burn them. See illustration below.

Put the plates away out of the reach of children until required in another room.
