## Who May Vote?

All British subjects, 21 years of age on or before October 29th, whose place of residence has been in Canada for one year and in the riding on July 5th and since. Registrars have lists in each polling subdivision and it is the duty of each elector to see that his or her name is on the list.

This can be done by applying to the Registrar in your own polling subdivision on any of the following days: October 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th. A person otherwise qualified to vote and whose name is not on the list may vote by having another qualified voter vouch for him or her at the poll on election day.

## Teachers' Convention

The Teachers of East and West Grey Institutes met in Convention at Knox Church, Owen Sound, on Thursday and Friday, October 1st and 2nd. Devotional Exercises were conducted by the Rev. J. D. McKenzie-Naughton, D.D., who afterwards delivered a short address.

Mr. Rydal, President of the West Grey Teachers' Institute, gave an address which dealt principally with the development of character in the schools.

Mr. H. G. Manning, B.A., of Stratford Normal School, gave a very interesting address on Composition. This was followed by an interesting talk by Mr. R. B. Harle, Supervisor of Music, in Owen Sound schools.

Classes from the various schools of the city rendered selections in a very capable manner which very much pleased their audience.

Mr. F. A. Coombs, M.A., of the College of Education, Toronto, delivered a very interesting address on spelling.

The Friday morning session opened with an address by Dr. S. Huff of Meaford, on "Child Psychology" and the result of his teaching on former pupils.

Mrs. S. L. Hale dealt with the question of discipline in the schools, emphasizing firmness, tact and decision combined with cheerfulness, fresh air and singing in the school.

Mr. Jas. Shaw gave a very able talk on writing, what constitutes good writing, namely, speed, legibility and beauty.

Mr. F. E. Coombs, B.A., of Toronto, gave a splendid address on literature, pointing out the fact that in order to properly teach literature the teacher must be realistic.

Miss Alma Thompson dealt in a very interesting manner with the subject, "The Daily Vacational Bible School," conducted in Owen Sound during four weeks of midsummer holidays.

Mr. Manning brought the morning session to a close by an address on "The Project Method of Teaching."

In the afternoon short talks were given on the suitability of the present school curriculum by Mr. J. Lang of Deshore, and Miss Shler.

Mrs. E. Graham gave an interesting talk on hot lunches in rural schools, setting forth both its disadvantages and advantages.

Mr. S. Petrie gave short talks on Art in the Public Schools showing standard works of art which he uses in his classroom to stimulate interest in and appreciation for not only their beauty, but also the great masters of whose hand and brain they are the product. Before closing, Mr. Small of Meaford, on behalf of the teachers of East Grey Institute, thanked those of the West Grey Institute for their hospitality.
