Mrs. Robert Torry
One of the oldest and most highly esteemed residents of Glenelg township passed away on Tuesday, October 29th, 1925, in the person of Mrs. Robert Torry. The deceased, whose maiden name was Magdalene Esch, was 82 years of age and had resided on the farm where she died since her marriage to the late Robert Torry 63 years ago. Since the death of her husband in January 1904, her son, Robert J. Torry, has resided with her on the old homestead, con. 3, Glenelg. She was a woman of sterling qualities and was a consistent member of the Lutheran church. Three sons and two daughters, all residing in Glenelg township, survive, namely: George, Robert J., and Luther W. Torry; Mrs. James Ellis and Mrs. John Camp.

The funeral took place on Friday afternoon to Markdale Cemetery and was largely attended by friends and neighbors. Rev. Mr. Crickington, Baptist minister, conducted the services at the house and grave. The pallbearers were, Thos. and Clark Torry, John Connor, Stephen Bennett, John Robinson, Elijah Bennett, John Ellison and Peter D'Arcy. Beautiful floral tributes were placed on the casket by members of the family.

The late Mrs. Torry was a kind and obliging neighbor and her death is regretted by a wide circle of friends who sympathize with the family in their bereavement.

Mrs. William Levi Sen.
After an illness extending over the past two months there passed away at Markdale on Wednesday afternoon, October 21st, 1925, another of the old residents of this village in the person of Mrs. William Levi. The deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Jane Hutton, was 73 years and 11 months old and had resided here since her marriage to Mr. Levi over fifty years ago. She was a woman of many fine qualities and was held in high esteem by all who knew her.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, to Markdale Cemetery. Rev. Dr. Gray conducted the services at the house and grave. The pallbearers were four sons, William, Alex., George and Norman Levi, and two grandsons, Carman and Carl Stodart. The casket was covered with floral tributes from the family and other friends.

The late Mrs. Levi is survived by her aged husband, five sons and four daughters, namely: William in town; Alex. in Stratford; George in Durham; John, when last heard from in Australia; Norman at home; Mrs. William Stoddart in Arden; Mrs. Samuel Dockwell in Stratford, and Mrs. Stephen Ransome at Berkeley. All were present at the funeral with the exception of John, Mr. Alex. Hutton, near Plesherton, is a brother of the deceased.

The bereft family have the sympathy of the community in the hour of their bereavement, and more particularly the aged husband.


