Miss Macphail Re-elected

For South-East Grey by a majority of 1407

As a result of the voting on Thursday Miss Agnes C. Macphail was again returned as the representative for South-East Grey in the House of Commons by a majority of 1407. The vote in the riding was 1941 less than that cast in 1921, the township vote falling short by 1537 and the town vote by 404, but the fact that there were three candidates in the field at that time partly accounts for the heavy vote. The Conservative vote in the townships on Thursday was increased over the 1921 vote by 327 and the Progressive vote was reduced by 839. In the towns and villages the Progressive vote was increased by 592 and the Conservative vote increased by 417. Miss Macphail's majority over Mr. Ball in 1921 was 2598. Speaking Contest

On Saturday afternoon, before an audience of over 300 people, the winners of Miss Agnes Macphail's Public Speaking Contest in Grey County, met in the High School auditorium in Flesherton. Of the 18 eligible to compete, 15 were present. The subject of the speeches was "The Federal Government."

Dr. O. J. Stevenson, M.A., Professor of English at the O.A.C., Guelph; Mr. Ralph Clemens, B.S.A., Agricultural Representative of Wellington County; and Mr. Jas. Shaw, B.A., Principal of Dufferin School, Owen Sound, were the judges. They had no easy task to decide on the winners, as the high quality of the speeches would have done credit to many an adult.

Throughout the speaking Miss Macphail occupied the chair. The different speeches were interspersed with a programme furnished by Miss Dugham, Miss Blanche Walker and Rev. Mr. Clemens, who led in community singing.

Teddy Jones of Shallow Lake won first prize and as a result will go to the opening of parliament at Ottawa next session. The second prize was won by Kathleen Walters of Normanby, the third by Clara Subject of Bentlinek, and for the fourth prize, two speakers tied: Dorothy Mann, Markdale, and Milton Shoultice of Holland. All these winners, commencing at the second, receive medals.

Miss Macphail paid a high tribute to Mr. T. S. Cooper, of the Department of Agriculture, for his hearty co-operation in the contests. Dr. Stevenson gave the decision of the judges and congratulated Miss Macphail on holding such a successful contest.

Dorothy Mann, who won fourth prize, is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Mann of this village. She is but ten years of age and so was quite young to participate in such a competition. She is a pupil in the Markdale Public School, in the Junior Third Class, taught by Miss Mable McLoughry. Dorothy is a bright active child who is a general favorite with her comrades in their fun and games. The citizens of Markdale congratulate her on the honor of bringing one of the much coveted county prizes again to our village, after a very close contest in which all her competitors were older pupils. It will be remembered that last year, Maxine Lyons, a pupil in the third class in our local Public School, was successful in winning the first prize in this competition and so took the trip to Ottawa.

Death of Fred Douglass

The relatives here received the sad news on Monday of the death of Mr. Fred Douglass at Cobalt early that morning as a result of a fall received on the Saturday previous. Mr. Douglass, as a boy spent a good deal of his time with his grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. William Douglass, here and will be remembered by many of those with whom he attended school. A despatch from Cobalt, dated November 2nd, and published in Tuesday's Mail and Empire, gives the following particulars: "Thirty-eight hours after he sustained a fractured skull in a fall on the steps leading to the T. and N. O. Station here, Fred Douglass, manager of the Timagami Store of the Timagami Fur Co., died in the Mines Hospital here at three o'clock this morning, without regaining consciousness."

Douglass had been in Cobalt on business on Saturday, and was on his way to the train when the accident happened. Deceased was 24 years of age, and leaves his widow and one child. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Douglass, Carlaw Avenue, Toronto, who accompanied the remains to the city to-night.
