"Come Along, Boys, Here's a Church."

Once a ship was wrecked on a coral reef in the South Seas. The crew got ashore as best they could, using anything they had afloat as a life belt. Not knowing the island, they were afraid to go inland. For aught they knew its inhabitants might be cannibals and they had no desire to furnish forth a "canibal feast."

Presently one of the company climbed a nearby hilltop and risked a look over the island. Having won the summit he began to wave his arms excitedly, beckoning them. As they got nearer to him they heard him shouting, "Come along, boys, it's all right, here's a church."

The story is told by the famous Australian preacher, Rev. Henry Howard, who recently visited America. The church to those men was a symbol of security. They were no longer afraid.

Because the good news had been proclaimed there, those shipwrecked sailors felt safe. Without that symbol, they knew that their lives would not be worth a moment's consideration.

The Church in the midst has made a difference. It has been the cradle of smiting securities and liberties, of philanthropies and literatures, and engagements. The modern world all too often takes these things for granted, without recognizing their origins, Christianity has made all the difference.

The Church, for instance, has literally given Good Samaritans, and because of their life has taken on kinder and more humane aspects. They have been joined in every age—some known, most of them unknown—in the middle ages for instance, the Friars established themselves in the pestilential quarter of Paris ministering to the lepers. Men like St. Francis and St. Hugh of Lincoln would minister to lepers with their own hands, overcoming all resistance, caring for them in the spirit and name of Christ. Wherever Christianity has gone there have sprung up houses for lepers, orphanages, hospitals, schools. For the unprivileged and despised life has come to have new securities and new assurances. The world, Elizabeth says, John Howard, Stephen Grelle, and Shaftesbury found their inspiration in the Christian Gospel.

But the story of Christ has not ended.

Parks Wild Animals Losing Fear of Man.

Each succeeding year's round of marks bring new expressions of wonder and surprise at the rapidity with which the wild animals in the National Parks are losing their fear of man. Parks officials, who administer wild life protective measures, have watched this condition develop and to them it was to be expected, but to the tourist new to the parks the holding up of one's car on a park highway by a band of friendly Rocky Mountain sheep, a novel experience.

Visitors to Rocky Mountain parks in Alberta are always sure to have close-up views of mountain sheep and other wild animals at different points on the highways, and bears are frequent visitors to the bush-trunks of most of the trees in the parks. In the past year or two elk, among the most fearsome animals, have been reported to have made their appearance on the golf links at Banff while play was in progress. In the early part of October of this year about fifteen elk trotted out on the roadway of the 13th hole, on the way from the Bow river to the upland forests. These exhibitions of animal friendliness are not confined to Rocky Mountain parks. In Jasper Park, on the occasion of Sir Douglas Haig's visit in July of this year, two young black bears interrupted the Elk Marshal's game by their appearance on the links.

The growth in numbers of wild animals in the parks and the ease with which they may be encountered and photographed is year by year becoming a greater attraction to tourists.

The Prevention of Measles.

The prevention and treatment of measles by the use of serum from a person who has recently had the disease is one of the most fruitful conquests of preventive medicine, and should be included in all public health programmes.

Mesles is to-day the gravest of the communicable diseases affecting children. From the viewpoint of mortality it ranks before scarlet fever, whooping cough and diphtheria. In France it killed 30,600 children from 1906 to 1913, while its victims throughout Europe, from 1900 to 1910 numbered about 4 million.

Those most in danger of measles are children of the poor who live in large cities. Its effects on such children contrast very strikingly with the diseases it occurs among children of well-to-do parents and children who live in rural places. The high mortality of measles in the cities among the poor is not due solely to hospital conditions, but is a consequence of the poverty of the children, the unfavorable conditions in their homes, and the early age at which they catch the disease.
