Boy Scouts

On Monday night it was paid to the shore of Lake Huron and a splendid location has been secured for a camp site. Although there is about ten acres of bush and clearing reaching down to the water's edge. Running through the camp is a creek of fresh good water and there is a sand bottom for bathing in the lake. Three of our local scouts and the following were in the party and helped in selecting the site. The trip will be run in separate units which will comply for instruction and recreational purposes. Each unit will provide for its own cooking and sleeping accommodation. In the afternoon one of our scout masters, Mr. J. R. Smith, who is a good swimmer, will be the first to take the boys to the lake. The first time that Markdale boys have attended a scout camp, three of the things that must be emphasized is that they are allowed only to swim and only under competent leadership. Destruction will be given in the necessary manner. Expenses will be paid to the maximum possible.

Visitors may come to the camp on Sunday afternoon August 8th, or Thursday August 12th. The entrance to the camp is about one mile north of Port Elgin and the route will be marked by signs.

R. T. Edwards Chosen

At a well attended convention held in Durham on Monday, Mr. R. T. Edwards of Glenelg was chosen as the Conservative candidate for South-East Grey for the Dominion election on September 14th. Eight others were nominated, namely: Dr. L. G. Campbell of Markdale; Dr. D. Jamieson of Durham, Messrs. D. McTavish of Flesherton, W. L. Taylor of Osprey, R. J. Ball and M. S. Armstrong of Hanover, Jas. Russell and J. D. McDowell of Dundalk. All withdrew and Mr. Edwards nomination was made unanimous. Mr. Joseph Harris of Scarborough was the chief speaker of the day.
