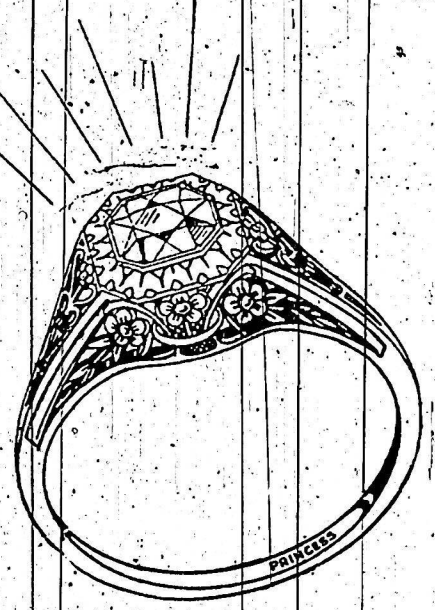

Mrs. Ellen Neely laid to Rest

The lamented death of Ellen Lougheed, wife of the late Jacob Neely, on Tuesday, March 29th, at her late residence, 927 Bathurst St., Toronto, came as a shock to her family, although she had been confined to her bed, and tenderly nursed for nearly fifteen months from heart trouble. She was a very patient sufferer, although her mind was ever alert to help others, and her example will always be remembered by those who are left behind to mourn her loss.

The late Mrs. Neely was in her 72nd year and was married some fifty years ago in Rocklin, where she lived for many years and was an ardent worker in Temple Hill Presbyterian Church until moving to Meaford seventeen years ago, but owing to her health she was not able to continue church work. Some seven years later the family moved to Toronto. Surviving here are her two daughters and four sons: Mrs. E. Holley, Toronto; Mrs. R. A. Holley, Lucky Lake, Sask.; and Edgar, Fred, Alfred and Lawrence, of Toronto.

The funeral was held on Thursday afternoon to Prospect Cemetery and the high esteem in which deceased was held throughout her wide circle of friends and relatives was truly manifested in numerous wreaths and floral tributes. The pallbearers were: Mr. Robert Loughheed, of Matheson, Mr. J. H. Dean, of Newmarket; Fred and Alfred Neely, E. Holley and B. Currie of Toronto. 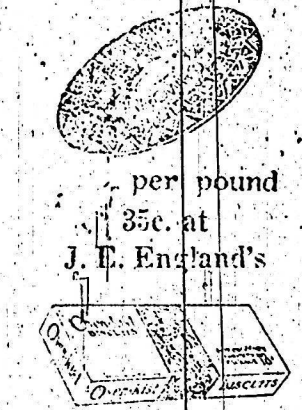

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Rae of Harkaway have the sympathy of all in their recent loss by fire.

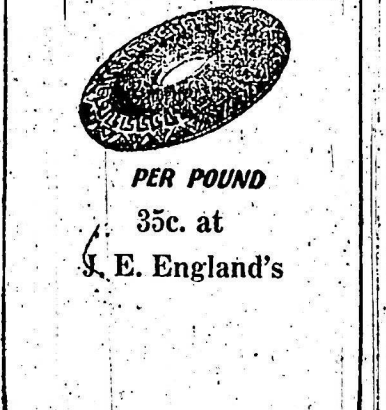
Miss Martha Menary, missionary home from India on furlough, gave an interesting talk on her work and on the ways of the Hindu at the Harkaway Church on Sunday.
