

Mr. John Winterburn

It is not often that the same family is bereft twice at almost the same time, but such has been the case in the Winterburn family.

At her home in Holland on Good Friday morning, April 15th, Mrs. Wesley Winterburn passed away after a lengthy and trying illness. The deceased was a most patient sufferer and bore the pain of her sickness with a Christian fortitude seldom exhibited. She had implicit faith in the future and had often repeated the words in John 14:1-3.

The late Mrs. Winterburn, who was a daughter of Mr. Robert McKay, was 37 years of age and was married on April 14th, 1915, to her now sorrowing husband. Four children also survive as well as her father, one brother, William McKay of Spring Hill and a sister, Mrs. Russell Dixon of Walters Falls.

On Saturday, April 16th, Mr. John Winterburn passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Atkinson, near Massis. He had been in failing health for about a month. The deceased, who was 76 years old, was born in Germany and came to Canada when a small child. He was a man of fine character and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. In September last he was bereft by the death of his wife and is now survived by six sons and three daughters, namely: Robert of Winnipeg; William, Herbert and Archie of Lucky Lake, Sask.; Wesley and Morrell of Holland; Mrs. John Atkinson, Strathavon; Mrs. Harry Simpson and Mrs. Harry Holley of Lucey Lake, Sask.

The remains were conveyed to the home of his son, Wesley, from where the double funeral took place to Markdale cemetery on Monday afternoon. It was one of the largest funerals ever held in this locality. The services at the house were most impressive and were conducted by Rev. Mr. McCarten of Holland Centre, assisted by Rev. W. G. Wakefield of Berkeley and Rev. Mr. Stephens of Strathavon. The pallbearers for Mrs. Winterburn were Messrs. Geo. Howey, Wm. Phillips, John Norton, Harvey Porter, Wesley Stoddart and John McNally, and for Mr. Winterburn Messrs. Alex. Acheson, D. L. Binn, T. H. Richardson, John Graham, Albert Ritchie and John Burton. Wedding Anniversary

By the decease of the late Mrs. G. Yeaddell (nee Caroline Mick) on March 29th, 1927, scarcely one year after the demise of her late husband Euphrasia has lost another of her old time pioneers.

Born near the town of Bradford, Simcoe County, on the 8th of August, 1845, she was the eldest daughter of William Mick. The family came to the then wilderness of Euphrasia and settled on a farm a few miles north of Goring. On January 1st, 1867, she was united in marriage to the late Mr. Geo. Yeaddell. By this union a large family was raised, viz.: John and William of Rocklyn; Thomas of Lloydminster, Sask.; George on the old homestead; Mary Ann (Mrs. C. Hopkins), Wilkie, Sask.; Mrs. W. McCullough, Collingwood, Mrs. R. McLean, Bognor, and Mrs. Wm. Clugston, Rocklyn. Besides these the deceased is survived by four brothers, William of Colorado, James of Iowa; Urastus of Chicago, and Henry of Orillia. 24 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren also survive.

The deceased was an ideal woman in building up the home, a good neighbor and highly respected in the community. She was a strong supporter of Ebenezer Methodist church. Some four and a half years ago she was stricken with a paralytic stroke which left her an invalid. The effects of this were borne with Christian patience up to March the 29th, when she suffered another stroke, resulting in her death in less than three hours. Her remains were interred beside those of her late husband on April 1st, in her old church cemetery, 11th line, Euphrasia, followed by a large crowd of sympathizing neighbors and friends. The Rev. Dr. McDougald, officiated at both house and grave. The pallbearers were all young men of the neighborhood, viz.: Otto Foy, John Lucas and Wesley Patton.

Thus one by one the old time pioneers have passed away and very few remain to till the farms which those early pioneers labored so hard for that they might be able to hand them down to their children.

Mrs. John Deakins

There passed away at her home near Warton on Thursday, April 14, 1927, Emily Gault, beloved wife of John Deakins, and a sister of Mrs. James McFadden of Markdale. The deceased suffered from a stroke in January from which she had almost fully recovered, but had another more severe on Wednesday and passed away as above stated. The late Mrs. Deakins, who was 63 years of age, was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Gault. She is survived by four brothers and one sister, namely: John and Andrew of Warton; Thomas of Wolseley, George of Zion, and Mrs. James McFadden. Forty-eight years ago she was married to Mr. Deakins and since then they have resided in Keppel township. Six sons and one daughter survive and all were present at the funeral excepting one son who resides in Saskatchewan. The aged husband also survives. The funeral in Zion church on Sunday was largely attended, the services being conducted by Rev. V. E. Lewis. The pallbearers were the five sons and her son-in-law, Wm. Leonard. The remains were laid to rest in Warton cemetery. Many beautiful floral tributes testified of the high esteem in which the deceased was held.
