

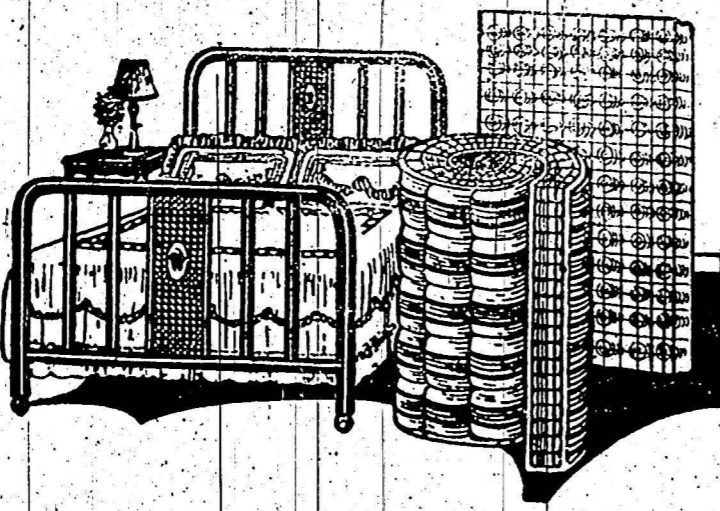

The Late John R. Baines

The funeral of the late John R. Baines, who passed away at the home of Mr. James Stewart in Owen Sound on Monday, May 15th, 1927, took place from the home of his son-in-law, Mr. Richard English, on Sunday afternoon to Markdale Cemetery. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. F. N. Bowes, pastor of Annesley United Church. At the house service Mr. J. H. Dundas sang an appropriate solo, "The End of the Road." The pallbearers were Messrs. Hugh Mercer, John Hannah, Mark Armstrong, Thomas Moran, James Stewart and James Howey. The flower bearers were seven grandsons, namely: Clifford Wright, John and Harold English, John H. Ernest, Victor and Archie Baines. The funeral was largely attended by old friends and neighbors.

Among the floral tributes placed on the casket were wreaths from each member of the family of the deceased; wreath from the Board of Education, St. Thomas; spray from the Fire Fighters of Moosej, Sask.; wreath from the Akkora family of Owen Sound; spray from Clara, Eva and Harold English.

Among those from a distance at the funeral were Mrs. Walter Bell of Saskatoon; Mrs. George Baines of Moosejaw; Mr. Archie Baines of St. Thomas; Mr. and Mrs. B. Wright of Chesley; Mr. and Mrs. John English of Plattville; Mr. Harold English of Niagara Falls, N. Y.; Misses Clara and Irene English of Toronto.

The late Mr. Baines, who was 83 years and two months old, was born on the Ratcliffe estate, Sowerby Bridge, Yorkshire, England, and came to Canada when he was 12 years of age. The family first settled in Sullivan township, but later moved to Holland where the deceased farmed for some years. After quitting the farm the deceased was in the coal and wood business here for some years. About ten years ago he retired from active business and since that time had been a resident of Owen Sound. His wife, whose maiden name was Martha Young, died 27 years ago. He is survived by one son, Archibald Baines of St. Thomas, and five daughters, Mrs. B. Wright of Chesley, Mrs. Richard English of Markdale, Mrs. Walter Bell of Saskatoon, Mrs. George Baines of Moosejaw, and Mrs. Duncan McKinnon, also in the west.

The late Mr. Baines was a man highly respected and was active until the end of his days. He was well read and was always active in promoting the moral welfare of the community in which he lived. His was a life well spent and his passing is regretted by a wide circle of friends.
