Owen Sound, July 1st and 5th.

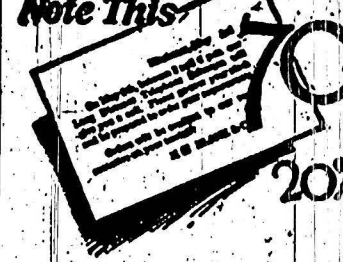
Mount Forest, during Old Home Week, with the races at Arthur and Grand Valley to follow.
