Mr. Schlyur Douglas, an old Vandeleur boy, now of Edmonton, Alberta, who a couple of years ago organized the movement for the collection and re-distribution of used and left over Sunday School papers and periodicals, and who has been delivering a series of lectures throughout Ontario, occupied the pulpit in Vandeleur church on Sunday afternoon and gave an exceedingly interesting account of his work in this connection. Mr. Douglas described the work as unique in the Dominion of Canada, or in fact anywhere. At the beginning he attended to the work himself, but so tremendously has it grown that today a large staff of C.G.T. girls are employed every Saturday sorting and mailing thousands of papers which are sent to boys and girls throughout Alberta who would otherwise not receive any. The system developed by Mr. Douglas is very thorough and his description of the work is well worth the object of his lectures in Ontario and other provinces. Both Mr. Douglas and his staff of girls do the work voluntarily and without remuneration, and his many friends in this community wish him God speed in his unselfish work. Mr. Douglas will shortly publish a book in which a full description of the work will be given.
