SUMMER CARE OF ROSES. According to A. H. Tomlinson, of he4 Ontarlo Agricultural College, ii is essential to practice pruning with roses right through the summer if the best results are to be obtained. Old flowers, or any dead or weak shows should be kept removed. In the onfig part of the season, particularly old lowering shoots when past their best, should be cut back to a strong prominent bud. With teas and some times hybrid perpetuals, new flower. ing good will at once start to appear, In this case a quick acting fertilizer such as nitrate of soda, blood manarely or acid phosphate, should be detributed over the surface of the soil near the plant.
