

TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHTS AND FUTURE TRANSPORTATION

Can the Boldest of This Generation Foresee the Future.

THE PAST OFFERS NO GUIDE.

With the world's acclaim ringing in the ears of the cool young daredevil that fearlessly winged his way from safety, out over the wide Atlantic, to fame, we cannot but wonder as to the future.

In 1910 the New York World offered a \$10,000 prize for the first man who would fly from Albany to New York over the river Hudson, and no provision was made about it being a non-stop flight. The distance was a total of 240 miles. Glen Curtiss signified his intention of flying for the prize and on Sunday, May 31st, he started on his venture some trip.

First Distance Record. Curtiss made Poughkeepsie on his first trip. On the morning of July 25, 1909... the memorable year that Glenn H. Curtiss, flying at Betheny Field at Rheims, France, broke all aerial speed records with forty-eight miles an hour. Louis Blériot took off from Les Barques, near Calais, in his little monoplane and landed near Dover, on the English Coast.

Like Captain Charles Lindbergh, the portly Frenchman with a red mustache ventured forth a week after another man had failed and while another was still waiting for what he called favorable weather.

Blériot was 37 years old and was not for the glory of France and a \$5,000 prize offered by the London Daily Mail for the first to fly the Channel—the same channel which Gertrude Ederle swam. Blériot had injured his foot in a flight and a week before Herbert Latham, one of his rivals, had tried and failed to traverse the distance from France to England.

Count de Lambert, another contestant for the honors, was at Calais waiting for better weather. It was a Sunday morning, Blériot rose at 2:30 a.m., tuned up his motor and flew fifteen kilometers around Calais. He had to wait for the sun to rise, but when it did he signalled the French destroyer Esclapette that he was ready.

"In an instant I am in the air," he wrote, describing his daring flight. "My engine is making 12,000 revolutions, almost the highest speed, in order that I may get quickly over the telephone wires along the edge of the cliff."

He overtook the destroyer, passed it, and flew only 250 feet above the choppy waters. "I drive on... I turn my head to see if I am proceeding in the right direction. I am amazed that there is nothing to be seen, neither the destroyer, nor France or England. I am alone for ten minutes I am lost! I am in a strange position to be alone, guided only by the compass in the air over the middle of the Channel."

SUDDENLY SEES DOVER CASTLE. "I touch nothing. My hands rest lightly on the levers and I let the airplane take its own course. I care not whether it goes. For ten minutes I continue... and then, twenty minutes after I left the French Coast, I see the green cliffs of Dover Castle, and away to the west the spot where I had intended to land."

"He has to fight the wind, but he steers valiantly and he gets above the hollow where he is going to land. The breeze turns him around twice, he stops his motor and drops twenty meters.

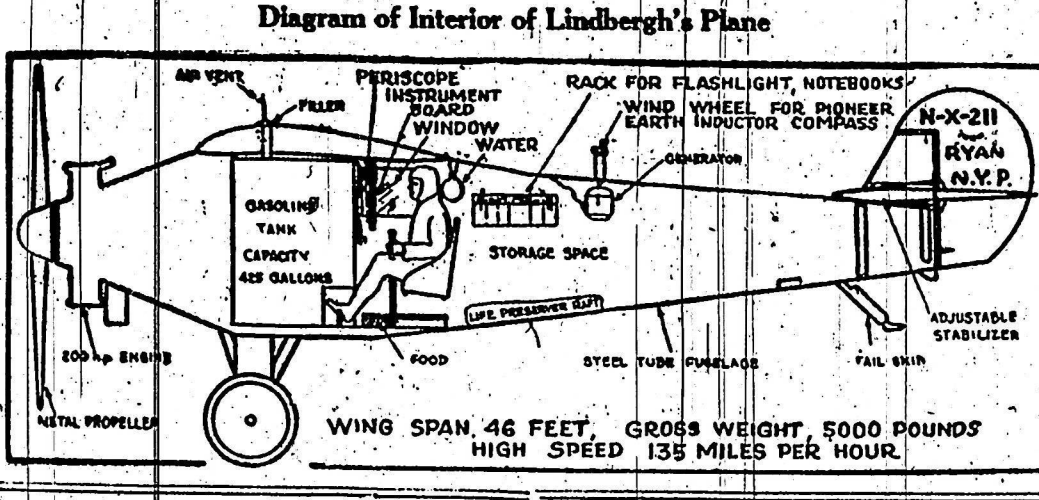
A handful of soldiers loiter there curiously and two Frenchmen have been waving the tricolor flag. Blériot runs overt to them and they smother him with hearty French kisses.

The word goes forth. Dover begins dressing and comes out to see him. His wife arrives by boat. His friends knock over his breakfast in their eagerness to kiss him and shake his hand.

And back at Calais, poor Latham hangs about the air. He was the first to attempt the flight, but he failed. Latham, who, the week before, had had to come down in the Channel.

New British Stamp May Soon Be Rare. There has been some criticism among League officials because of the use of the British ruler's portrait on stamps in a land not strictly a British colony, and accordingly the new Tanganyika set may have only a short life. The uniform design is a head of King George, displacing the familiar griffin, although the inscription reads "Mandate Territory of Tanganyika."

What of the Future. "Lucky Lindy," the "Flying Fool," has just "crossed" the Atlantic with a 3,690-mile non-stop flight to his credit

WHITE LINE VALUE RECOGNIZED BY DISCREET JUDGES

British Experience Lends Support to Plan Which Helps All Drivers. VISIBLE BY NIGHT.

Properly Maintained Prove Particularly Helpful at Sharp Turns.

HOW TO BANISH THE MOTH AND HER FAMILIES

Avoid the Overadvertised, Harmful Destroyers; Follow Simple but Effective Standard Methods.

The moth which we see—the miller which flies about during the spring and late summer, or in heated houses, most any time of the year—does not eat the clothing, but it lays eggs which hatch in from five to ten days and the ensuing larvae with their web-developed jaws cause the destruction of clothing, rugs and upholstery.

Cleaning and Brushing. As a preliminary to any treatment, clothing should be vigorously brushed or beaten and well sunned (if possible).

Fumigation. Purification with carbon disulphide is a most effective treatment. Clothing should be thoroughly brushed, as described above, and then packed in a tight trunk or chest and fumigated out of doors.

How to Use Moth Balls. Another excellent method of protecting clothing is the liberal use of naphthalene in the form of moth balls or flakes.

Martyr or Easy Mark. When you begin to feel like a martyr it's time to stop and size up the situation. If the other fellows always wish all the dirty jobs on you, maybe it's because you haven't backbone enough to insist that the jobs be fairly divided.

COMMERCIAL AIR SERVICE REPORTED GROWING FAST IN EVERY PART OF WORLD

Washington—Commercial aviation is gaining a strong foothold throughout the world, latest reports to the Commerce Department showed. In all parts of the world the new method for passenger, freight and mail transportation is being used more frequently and additional facilities are being installed every day.

The first restaurant service on any commercial air line has been established on the new Geneva-Napoli line. Air mail service is soon to be established between Adelaide, South Australia, and Perth, Western Australia.

Hydroplane passenger service between Vera Cruz and Progreso, Mexico, with stops at Puerto Mexico, Frontera, Laguna and Campeche has been started, according to advices from Vera Cruz. The plane accommodating eight passengers and one ton of freight has been put into service.

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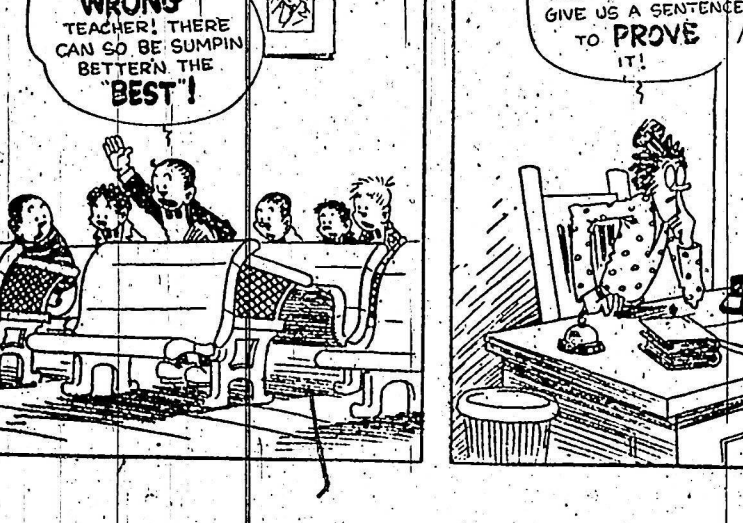

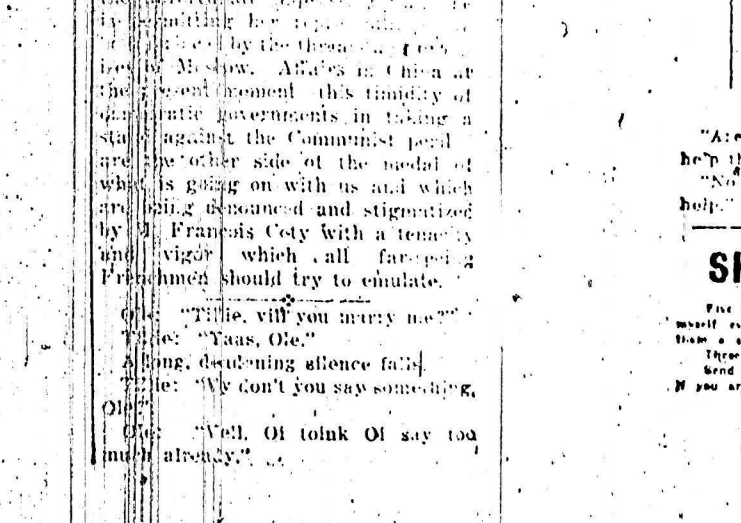
