To Revive One Apparently Dead From Drowning Electric Shock or Suffocation

An article was contributed under the above heading, last week, and we are advised that the method advocated was not the latest and most approved, nor is it the most simple. Any person willing to learn the correct method should get in touch at once with one of the local Boy Scout officials, who will be glad to arrange for expert instruction. Above all things never use a pulmotor. The pulmotor has by no means justified its existence. The method taught to Boy Scouts under the direction of the Hydro Commission is now the only one advocated by authorities, and recently an official was sent to the United States from Canada to give instruction to the Police and Fire-Depts. there. The use of the pulmotor is very frequently followed by bleeding from the lungs and its dangers more than balance its efficiency.
