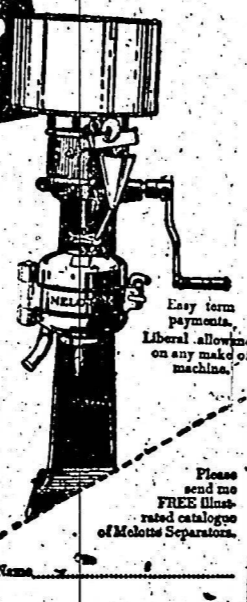

Our Flag

Let us fly it on July 1st

The Union Jack is the national flag of the British Empire, and is made up of the old national flags of the three former Kingdoms of England, Scotland and Ireland. In 1606, King James 6th of Scotland who was also King James 1st of England, added to the flag of Scotland (which was a blue flag with the white diagonal cross of St. Andrew), a red cross with a white border to represent the flag of England (which was a white flag with the red cross of St. George). Thus the Scottish and English flags were blended to form the first British Union Jack.

The word "Jack" came from the ancient name "Jaquie" given to the white worn by soldiers over their armor, to distinguish them in the confusion of battle. Usually the shirt of the soldier's country. Thus a soldier in a white shirt with a red cross was known to be an Englishman, fighting under the "Jaquie of St. George."

In 1801 the red diagonal cross, retaining a portion of its white ground (or field) representing the white flag with the red cross of St. Patrick of Ireland, was added to the flag, making the Union Jack of Great Britain and Ireland—and now of the whole Empire.

From this brief sketch of the history of our Flag we can see that it stands first of all for Unity. Unity is strength, as was clearly demonstrated by the rally of all parts of the Empire to the common cause in the World War. The honor of the flag of other peoples by Britain has been possible because the Empire has been united. The safety, not only of these highly favored lands, but of the world, but the safety of all others who have come to live under the flag has been possible because of the unity of the Empire. The people of Australia, comparatively few in number, are safe to-day as are the tens of millions of India, because the flag that both countries fly is the Union Jack. For the same reason New Zealand, South Africa and Canada, together with many Protectorates and Dependencies, can rest assured of the safety and protection which is guaranteed by the Union Jack.

There is just the possibility that we do not fully realize all that our Flag stands for, and because we do not, there are those who would have it replaced by one of another design.
