Grey County Council met in Owen Sound last week, the Warden, Mr. Chas. Holm, presiding.

On Monday evening the first session was held at which a number of communications and accounts were presented and referred to the various committees.

At the session on Tuesday morning more accounts were presented and referred. The report of the Finance Committee, recommending a basis of assessment for the several municipalities in the County, was presented and adopted. The following are the amounts as recommended in the report:

The report of the County Roads Committee, toll of the preparations which had been made for work throughout the season.

The report of the Road and Bridge Committee, which was presented at the session on Wednesday morning, recommended the payment of several accounts and that Wm. McNally of Preston be paid \$500.00 for damages caused by the destruction of a bridge which was not re-built. The County property committee recommended the payment of several accounts and a statement showing receipts and payments was presented by the House of Refuge Committee.

At the session on Wednesday the Finance Committee recommended the payment of a number of accounts for the maintenance of the various hospitals in various parts of the County. They also recommended that \$25.00 be given to each of the Women's Institutes, 2100 County Road, and the Salvation Army, 1000 County Road, London. The Finance Committee's report also recommended the payment of several accounts. By a vote of 15 to 10 the assessment of the several municipalities and the rate at 25c. per acre for road purposes and three for roads. A by-law was also passed authorizing the Treasurer to receive and disburse the moneys from the various municipalities for the purpose of collecting the same.

The grant to the Suburban Area Commission was raised from \$25,000 to \$28,000, and \$500 extra was given to the Grey County Children's Shelter.
