A good crowd was present on Sunday afternoon to hear Dr. Crossley and Mr. Leonard.

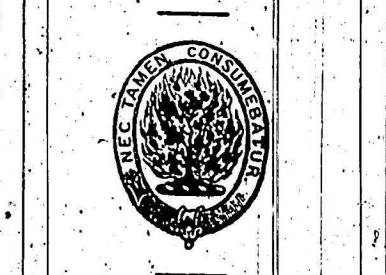

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Anniversary Services at St. Andrew's Church

70th Anniversary of the Presbyterian Congregation in Chatsworth

On Sunday last, June 26th, the anniversary services of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church were largely attended at both services. The services were in charge of the pastor, Rev. W. A. MacWilliam, assisted by Rev. Alexander McGregor, B.A., of Toronto, who preached both morning and evening.

At the morning service he took for his text the words found in Rev. 2-10, "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life," particularly stressing the point that everyone should be faithful to their church. At the evening service his text was in 2nd Timothy 1-5, "When I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee which dwelt first in thy grandmother and thy mother Eunice and I am persuaded that in thee also."

Mr. McGregor is a fluent speaker and the congregation gave him the closest attention at both services. The music for the day was under the direction of the choir leader and was much appreciated by the congregation.

At the morning service Mr. Robert Deardle sang "Abide with me" in his usual capable manner; also an anthem by the choir, "Whence cometh my help." At the evening service, "Stepping in the Light" by the church quartette, and the choir again favoured the congregation with an anthem entitled "Blessed assurance," which was well received.

The church for the occasion was suitably decorated with cut flowers and plants.

This anniversary marks the 70th milestone in the history of the Presbyterians in Chatsworth and community. The Presbyterian congregation was fully organized in 1857 when the Rev. James Cameron was invited to call which was accepted, his induction did not take place until 1859. His pastorate continued until his death in 1883, and since that time the following ministers have served: Rev. John McAlpine, 1883-1884; Rev. Archibald Thompson, 1884-1885; Rev. John Little, 1885-1886; Rev. Finlay Matheson, 1886-1887; Rev. John McKinstry, 1887-1888; Rev. Robert Brydon, 1888-1889; and since 1925 the congregation has enjoyed the leadership of Rev. W. A. MacWilliam, under whose ministry the work has been successfully carried on until the present time.

The Ladies' Aid of this church met last Thursday last in connection with their garden party. The amount realized was very gratifying to the members.
