GETTING RID OF WEEDS

Co-operative Methods Have Been Tested for Ten Years.

More Farmers Should Get Into the Game—How to Control Perennial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass—Other Weed Destruction Methods Given Next Week.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

During the past ten years (1911-1921) the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union has conducted co-operative experiments in weed eradication. Over ninety farmers have carried out successful experiments. The weeds experimented with were—Perennial Sow Thistle, Twitch Grass, Mustard Camion or Cow Bell, Wild Mustard, Ox-eye Daisy, Field Bindweed, Wild Oats and Chess. Those who took part in these experiments printed by the experience. In nearly every instance they cleaned the field experimentally, and demonstrated to their own satisfaction the effectiveness of the method, tried, and at the same time their results furnished practical information to others.

Construction will be started shortly. It is announced, on the 2,400,000 bushel elevator to be erected by the Alberta Wheat Pool at Vancouver, and it is expected that the big plant will be ready to handle grain from the 1927 crop.

Twenty-three members of the Ohio Wesleyan Glee Club sailed recently on the Canadian Pacific steamship Montrose for England, where they will visit a short while before beginning a singing tour of the continent. The tour will last about a month.

The Holy Land is to be officially represented at the World's Poultry Congress, to be announced. Dr. David Uri of the poultry experiment station in Palestine, will represent that country at the great international event to be held in Ottawa from July 27th to August 4th.

A new direct steamship service between Saint John and Havana Cuba will likely be inaugurated from the first of September, when the potato shipments start, if the New Brunswick Government and the shippers of the province back the project. F. L. Estabrooke, of Sackville, just returned from a trip of enquiries in Cuba.

A bed which rocks its occupant to sleep has been invented by Sir Alfred Yarrow, British scientist. Search for the missing French aviator, Nungesser and Goll has been resumed by two Pathé News men who arrived at the C.P.R. station in Montreal recently enroute to this point. Three of the party will form a land expedition, while the fourth will fly into the Quebec woods from Grand'Mere. They will stay in until the mystery of the fliers is cleared up.

B. Macdonald, former Saskatchewan aviator and now a leading stunt flier in Los Angeles, has written asking if the citizens of Saskatchewan will provide a plane to be entered in the flight from the Pacific coast to Hawaii, which he will fly. He offers Saskatchewan backers half the prize money and half any other receipts, should he be successful. The President of the Star has announced that the Star is prepared to make a substantial contribution towards the \$15,000 required. The plane would be named the "City of Saskatchewan."

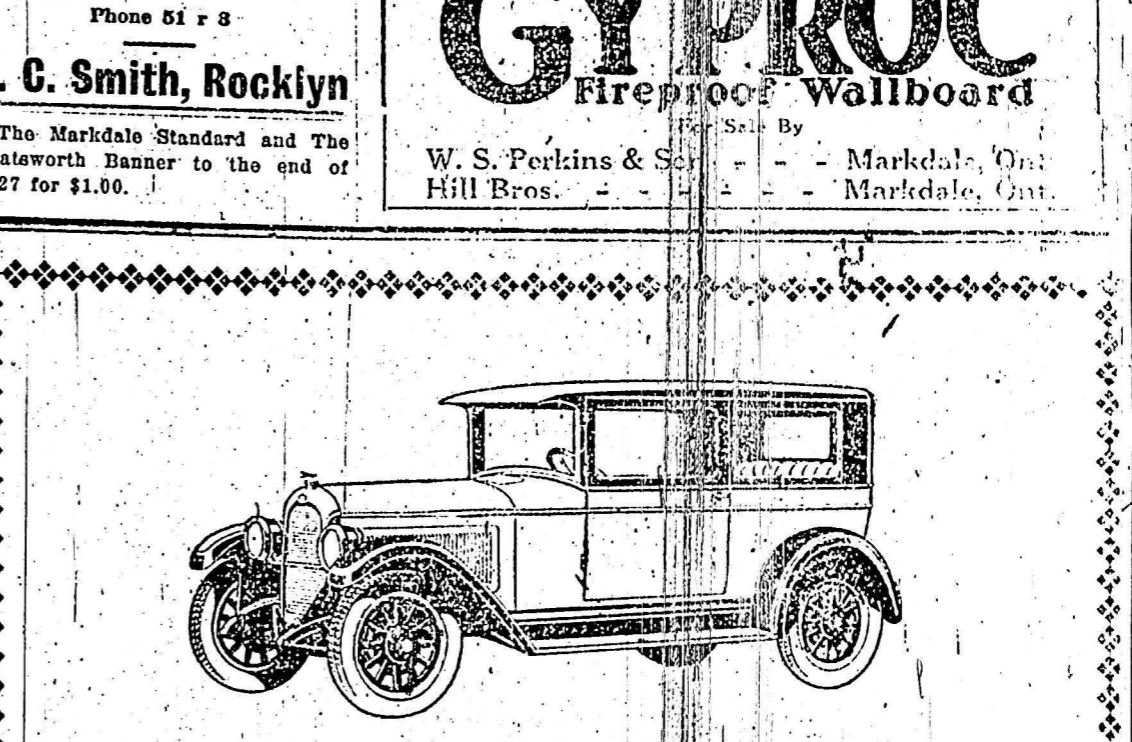
