## The Late Mrs. Maria Taylor

The death occurred of a very highly respected resident of Owen Sound in the person of Maria Taylor, widow of the late Thomas H. Taylor, 1358 4th avenue east, at 8 o'clock on Saturday evening following a painful illness of a little more than seven weeks, the result of a fall in her own home in which she sustained a fractured hip. At the advanced age of 82 years her injury shocked her system to such an extent that she failed to recover. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Fuller of Bolton, Ont., where she was born and spent her early life, and where she was married to Thomas H. Taylor, who predeceased her some 16 years ago. Soon after their marriage they moved to the township of Argentea, where they resided for many years, after taking up residence at Markdale, where they lived for eight years, coming to Owen Sound 16 years ago, where she has since made her home. She was the possessor of a genuine Christian character, a loving and devoted mother, and greatly beloved by all because of her kindly disposition and thoughtfulness for others. She was a devoted member of the Central United Church. She was the mother of eight children, six of whom survive, Miss Susie Taylor at home; William and Wesley Taylor in the west; Thomas Taylor in California; Mrs. Geo. Robinson, Vancouver, and Mrs. William Duckett, Eugene; also one sister, Mrs. Wm. Scott, Toronto, and one brother, William Fuller, of Bolton, Ont.

The funeral took place Tuesday attended by a large number of sympathizing friends, Rev. C. Elmer Kinney officiating at the grave. Friends from a distance were Mrs. S. Scott of Toronto, sister of the deceased; Mrs. Mrs. J. Reid of Toronto; Mrs. Thos. ## Confirmation Class

A large congregation greeted the Rev. the Archbishop of Huron when he visited the Church on Monday to administer the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation. Of a class of twenty, fifteen were presented on Monday and the remainder will be confirmed at a Special Service in Owen Sound during the fall of this year. The Archbishop has the wonderful gift of making his addresses interesting from start to finish and his instruction, based on St. Peter IV: 10, "Minister... as good stewards," was listened to with rapt attention. During his address the Archbishop complimented the congregation upon the marked progress that is being made, but he advised, there is going on a great advancement at every point of the Diocese. At present he was not able to name the real cause; already there had been confirmed more persons this year than in any previous whole year, more churches are being built and others enlarged, and these conditions cannot be explained as the result of ordinary causes.
