The Late Mrs. Wm. Taylor

The death occurred of a very highly regarded resident of Owen Sound in the person of Marin Fuller, widow of the late Thomas H. Taylor, 1358 4th avenue east, at 8 o'clock on Saturday evening following a painful illness of a little more than seven weeks, the result of a fall in her own home in which she sustained a fractured hip. At the advanced age of 83 years her injury shocked her system to such an extent that she failed to recover. Deceased was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Fuller of Bolton, Ont., where she was born and spent her early life, and where she was married to Thomas H. Taylor, who predeceased her some 10 years ago. Soon after their marriage they moved to the township of Artemesia, where they resided for many years, after taking up residence at Markdale, where they lived for eight years, coming to Owen Sound 16 years ago, where she has since made her home. She was the postess of a genuine Christian character, a loving and devoted mother, and greatly beloved by all because of her kindly disposition and thoughtfulness for others. She was a devoted member of the Central United church.

She was the mother of eight children, six of whom survive, Miss Susie Taylor at home; William and Wesley Taylor in the west; Thomas Taylor in California; Mrs. Geo. Robinson, Vancouver, and Mrs. William Duckett, Eugenia; also one sister, Mrs. Wm. Scott, Toronto, and one brother, William Fuller, of Bolton, Ont.

The funeral took place to Greenwood Cemetery on Tuesday attended by a large number of sympathizing friends, Rev. C. Elmer Kinney officiating at the grave. Friends from a distance were Mrs. S. Scott of Toron-
