## Vehicles to Carry Lights at Night After Oct. 1st

An amendment has been added to the Highway Traffic Act whereby it is compulsory for all vehicles when on a highway after dusk and before dawn to carry in a conspicuous position on the left side a lighted lamp showing white to the front and red to the rear. These lamps must be clearly visible at a distance of 200

feet. Many persons are of the opinion that a reflector may be used instead of a lighted lamp but the Act distinctly states that a reflector of a design approved by the Department may be used in lieu of a lamp on vehicles used for carrying inflammable materials or on vehicles structurally unsuitable for carrying a lighted lamp. All others must carry a lamp.

The Department of Highways have stated their intention to enforce this Act and have provided penalties for violation of the same as follows:

For the first offence a penalty of \$5.00; for the second offence a penalty of not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$10.00; and for any subsequent offence a penalty of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.

Lamps complying with all the requirements of the Department can be secured from local merchants.
