Miss Eva Lee of Markdale spent a few days with Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Dixon recently.

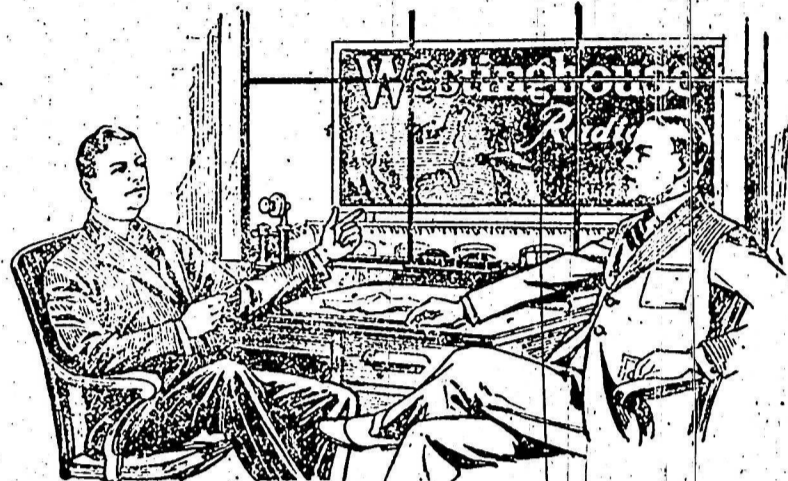

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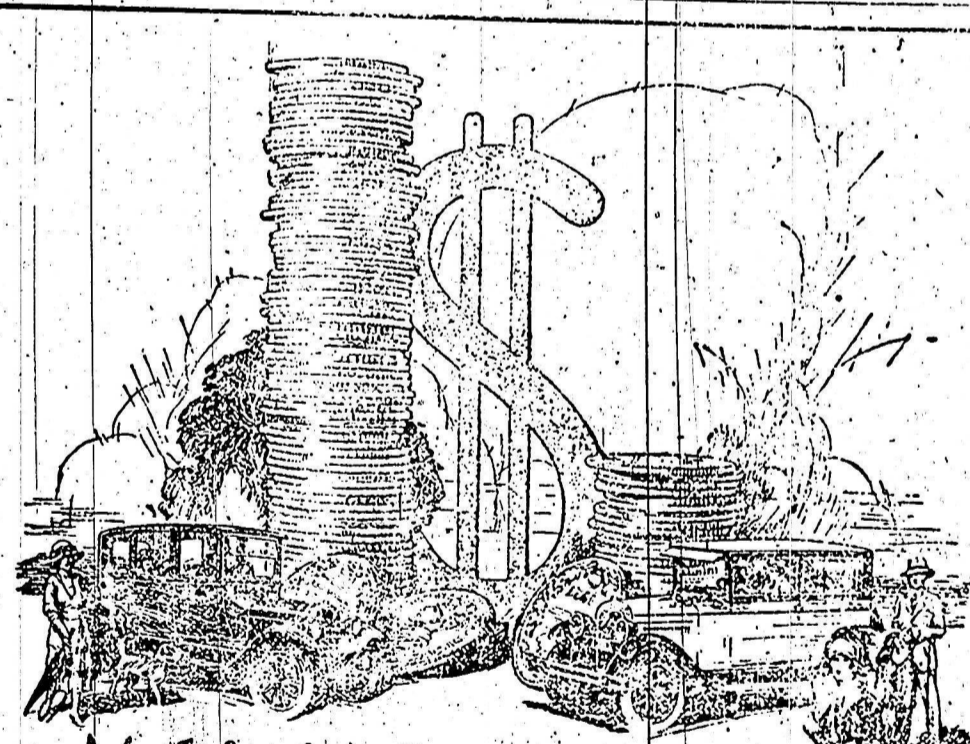
