Bandmaster Park Dead

Mr. J. T. Park, well-known jeweler, musician and bandmaster, passed away at his home in Midland on Thursday evening, October 13th. The late Mr. Park had been in band practice that evening and on returning home had partaken of lunch before retiring. He was about to retire for the night when he fell to the floor and was dead before any of the members of the family could get to him.

Joseph Thomas Park was born near Proton Station 61 years ago. When 21 years of age he left the farm and went to Shelburne where he took charge of the band and learned the jewelry business. In June 1892 he opened up in business for himself in Dundalk and for a little over ten years conducted the business successfully and made a success also of Dundalk Citizens' Band. In January 1903 he moved to Portage la Prairie and later resided at Boissevain, Killarney and Winnipeg. In each of which places he conducted bands. He went overseas in charge of a band and on returning went into business in Winnipeg where Mrs. Park passed away in 1922. Early in 1923 he returned to Dundalk and again went into the jewelry business. The band, of course, was also under his direction. In 1926 he sold in Dundalk and moved to Midland where he was successful in his business as well as with the band.

The late Mr. Park is survived by three sons and two daughters; all musicians of exceptional ability. The body was taken to Winnipeg for burial beside the remains of the late Mrs. Park.

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Perkins and Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Colgan went to Midland on Saturday for the funeral services. Mr. Perkins had been associated with the late Mr. Park in band work for about 33 years and the editor of this paper was one of his "pupils" class, who started in Dundalk band in December 1892.
The late Mr. Park was a man of many talents and was held in the highest esteem by a large number of friends.

John Walker Dead

A great shadow of profound sorrow passed over the whole community on Thursday morning, October 13th, 1927, when it became known that John Walker of Pleasant Valley, near Berkeley, had passed to the Great Beyond. Although he had been in poor health for some time his condition was not thought serious until about four weeks previous to his death.

The deceased was born in Holland township in 1868 and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Walker of Mr. Pleasant. In 1900 he was married to Margaret McConnell of Dundalk and moved to Pleasant Valley where he spent the remaining years of his life.

Mr. Walker had a quiet, jovial disposition and was loved by all who knew him. He was a faithful worker of Berkeley United Church of which he was a member for twenty-five years and an active member of Berkeley L.O.L. 176 under which auspices the funeral was conducted. He will be greatly missed in the home as well as the community.

Besides his sorrowing wife the late Mr. Walker leaves to mourn his loss one son, Frank, at home; one daughter, (Hazel) Mrs. Groves, Trenton; four brothers, George of Owen Sound, Jas. of Peterboro, Andrew of Chesley, Robt. of Borden, Sask., and two sisters, Mrs. T. K. Robinson, Dundalk, and Mrs. Geo. Rowe of Chatsworth.

The funeral on Sunday afternoon to Markdale Cemetery was very largely attended, showing the high esteem in which the deceased was held. The pastor, Rev. Mr. McCarter, assisted by Rev. Mr. Wilkinson of Clarkson; and Rev. Mr. Wakefield of Berkeley, two former pastors of the deceased, officiated at the house and grave. The pallbearers were Messrs. 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


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
