Mr. Wm. H. Heard Dead

J. C. Mercer's White Leghorn Hens  
defeated all pens, east of British Columbia, in the Canadian Egg Laying  
Contest, open to the world, at the  
Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

The Toronto Globe says the E. C.

Hens would have had a clean sweep

only for J. C. Mercer of Markdale,

Ont., who won 3rd prize. The B.C.

pions won 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th and 6th

places with England 7th.

The final report from Ottawa says,

J. C. Mercer's White Leghorns, all

second generation birds, finished third

and one much of their success to the

weight of their eggs, which earned

points that stand over 200 in excess

of their egg total. The year's score

was 2239.7 points for 2335 eggs. As

large eggs is the aim of every breeder

you will note the superiority of the

Mercer birds over the B.C. birds

in this respect.

each bird and by eliminating all

birds which failed to come up to the

high standard set by the owner. There
