Champions East of B. C.
 J. C. Mercer's White Leghorn Hens defeated all pens east of British Columbia, in the Canadian Egg Laying Contest, open to the world, at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa.
 The Toronto Globe says, the B. C. Hens would have had a clean sweep only for J. C. Mercer of Markdale, Ont., who won 3rd prize. The B. C. pens won 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th and 6th places with England 7th.

The final report from Ottawa says, J. C. Mercer's White Leghorns, all second generation birds, finished third and gave much of their success to the weight of their eggs, which earned points that stand over 200 in excess of their egg total. The year's score was 2237.7 points for 2035 eggs. As large eggs are the aim of every breeder you will note the superiority of the Mercer birds over the B. C. birds in this respect.

Their superiority over the others was accomplished by paying strict attention to the performance of each bird and by eliminating all birds which failed to come up to the high standard set by the owner. There will be a big demand for Mercer's eggs when the season opens next spring.

Mr. Wm. H. Heard Dead
 Mr. Wm. H. Heard passed away at his home on the Provincial Highway, south of this place on Monday forenoon after a couple of weeks' illness. His condition was not considered serious until Sunday when he became suddenly worse and gradually sank until the end came. Deceased, who was 62 years of age, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John H. Heard of Flesherton. He had resided in this locality for a number of years. A widow, three sons and one daughter survive. The funeral is being held this (Wednesday) afternoon at Flesherton Cemetery.

Her husband predeceased her 23 years ago. The funeral was held from the home of her daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Ward of Kimberley, and was conducted by Rev. Mr. Stotesbury, of Kimberley United Church, who spoke comforting words to the bereaved relatives and paid a high tribute of respect to the departed.
