Fatal Auto Accident

Mr. William Henry Fothergill of
Beaverdale, in Euphrasia township,
was instantly killed on Saturday eve-
ning, December 3rd, when his auto-
mobile turned over on the eleventh
line. He had been in Markdale and
was on his way home in company with
Mr. Cecil Brett when the accident oc-
curred. The accident took place on
a good piece of road although it was
icy in places. The car skidded to
the left side and then across to the
right and turned over. Brett was
able to free himself and with help
lifted the car off Mr. Fothergill who
it was found had been instantly killed
when his head hit the roadway. The
car, a Chevrolet touring, was almost
a complete wreck.

The late William H. Fothergill,
who was 32 years of age, was one of
the finest young men in the locality
and was held in the highest respect
by all. He was a member and an
active worker in Beaverdale Anglican
church, having served as Warden. He
was married five years ago to Gladys,
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. John-
ston of Lily Oak, who now survives.

The funeral took place on Tuesday
afternoon at Harkway Cemetery, the
services being conducted by Rev. Mr.
Dickson of Walters Falls. The pall-
bearers were: Messrs. Wesley Patton,
Stanley and Will Johnston, Earl,
George and Ercel Fothergill.

the members of the Anglican Church,
Beaverdale.

Among those here for the funeral
were: Mr. Fred Rodgers and Mr.
Wm. Green of Orangeville; Mr. and
Mrs. Harry Merriam; Mr. Stanley
Fothergill and Mr. and Mrs. Will
White of Westford; Mr. James War-
ring of Toronto.

The sad accident has cast a gloom
over the whole neighborhood and
Mrs. Fothergill and the other be-
loved relatives have the sympathy of
all in their hour of sorrow.
