Special Services at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on Mothers' Day

Mothers' Day was very fittingly observed at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church last Sunday. At 11 a.m. the Sabbath School, with a large attendance, followed the Mothers' Day program which is formulated by the Board of Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies of the Presbyterian Church.

Readings were given by Dorothy Gordon, Doris Merriam and Clifford McLaughlin. One of the special numbers was a duet by Mr. and Mrs. M. Cameron. Mrs. A. G. Chisholm gave a splendid address on "Mother," which was greatly appreciated by the Sabbath School, and at the close of her address little Mary Duff, on behalf of the school, presented her with a beautiful bouquet of flowers.

The usual large crowd was in attendance at the evening service and all were much impressed and touched throughout the address delivered by the Pastor, Rev. W. A. MacWilliam, who took as his text I Kings 2:19, "And the King rose up to meet her and bowed himself unto her and sat down on his throne and caused a seat to be set for the King's Mother, and she sat on his right hand." He referred to the prominent place given to mothers in the Bible and the high tributes paid to them and stressed the fact that obedience to parents and respect for them would result in a law-abiding people, for in learning to obey their parents, children also learned to be obedient to those in authority over them. The greatness and glory of the nation is in the hands and hearts of the mothers.

During the service 24 certificates were handed to the Sabbath School children for memorizing passages of Scripture assigned by the General Assembly, and a solo by Mrs. Jas. Cooner and a duet by Mrs. M. Cameron and Mrs. R. Kerr were much appreciated.
The church was beautified by many lovely plants and flowers, among them being the bouquet presented to Mrs. A. G. Chisholm at the morning service by the children, and others were the floral tributes received by mothers in the congregation from absent members of their families.
