Empire Day at School

Last Monday, Empire Day, was very fittingly celebrated at the local Public and Continuation Schools.
A short program was given by the students after which a most interesting and instructive address was delivered by Mr. G. D. Fleming of Owen Sound. The topic, in congruence with the day, dealt with Canada and the British Empire. The speaker began by emphasizing the fact that not only over two million students in Canada were assembling as we were today, but people in every part of the British Empire. To Canada's greatness he paid tribute to four groups—the Fathers of Confederation, the grandfathers and grandmothers of the present generation, those soldiers who died for their country in the last war and the teachers. He stressed, this point, "The British Empire will never be broken up by an outside force. If it becomes integrated it will be from within the Empire itself." In emphasizing this he said it was up to us, the Youth of Canada, to be loyal to the Empire. Loyalty, he continued, was not something gained over night. It began with loyalty to one's parents, to one's teacher and if the student listens not to his teacher and his parents, it is that individual who is liable to become the disloyal element in the Empire.
Words are indeed inadequate in describing the fineness of his speech. It was to say the least, a masterpiece, the hearing of which will leave Empire Day 1927 long to be remembered by the students of the school.
It was an open program and teachers and students were very sorry many of the townspeople did not avail themselves of hearing such a fine address. The meeting closed with "God Save The King."
