There will be a local election in Dundalk this year. For the Reeve Dr. McAlister, Geo. Stocks and M. W. Ridley are running. The latter was Clerk of the Village for several years and was freed by last year's Council. Six are in the field for Council, namely: James Carson, T. K. Robinson, J. Spanhouse, R. J. Russell, C. K. Armstrong and Jos. Duff, the latter a former resident of Markdale.

**The Vote on Monday**

Quite a number of people have a wrong impression of the vote on the rink question to be taken on Monday next. The question submitted is, "Are you in favor of the Council subscribing for shares to the extent of \$5000.00 in a company to be organized and known as the 'Markdale Community Hall and Rink Company'?" The vote is taken only to secure the information as to whether the ratepayers of the village are favorable or not. Even if the vote were unanimously in favor the Council has no authority to go ahead with the proposition. It will be necessary for the Ontario Government to pass legislation first, allowing the corporation to invest in the proposition. After that it will be necessary for the by-law to be passed giving the Council authority to issue debentures in order to raise the money.

The vote on Monday gives the Council no authority to invest even one cent in the rink proposition, but is taken to let the Ontario Government know whether or not the citizens of Markdale desire the legislation to permit them to submit the proposition to the Council.

Personally, I am of the opinion that there has been altogether too much money expended consistent with the returns and the necessities, and I can promise, if elected, that I will do my utmost to curtail this outlay, secure better values for the ratepayers on the expenditure, and endeavor to build and maintain our roads, a most important expenditure at the present time, at the lowest possible cost.
