County and District

H. C. Moody was re-elected Reeve of Dundalk by a majority of 84 over Geo. Stocks.

Dr. A. Turnbull formerly of Flesheron, has taken up residence in Inverness, Scotland.

For the Reeveship of Meaford Homer Reid defeated ex-Reeve W. T. Riley by a majority of 224.

George A. Bruder of Hanover died on Sunday, January 1st, as the result of being injured by a C.N.R. engine.

It is estimated that Shelburne's new pavement will cost that municipality in the neighborhood of \$65000.

Mr. C. C. Middlebro, a former Durham barrister, has been appointed city solicitor and assistant city clerk in Owen Sound.

There is agitation in Dundalk for improvement in the condition of the cemetery and not without real cause. Dundalk's cemetery is not a credit to that municipality.

Mrs. Mark Lear, widow of the late Mark Lear, at one time publisher of the Thornbury Review-Herald, died at the home of her mother in Thornbury on December 23rd.

Plans to form a live stock pool in Ontario have been announced by the United Farmers Co-operative Company. For the time being the pool will be confined to hogs.

A Better Seed train will be again operated by the Ontario Crop Improvement Association next spring. Grey County is numbered among the Ontario points to be visited.

The Globe Indemnity Co. has made settlement with Mrs. Percy Smith for the death of her son who was killed by an accident in Meaford, last summer. Mrs. Smith had entered action against the town and the claim was settled for \$1300.

Peter Quirk, a Melancthon township young man is lying in Orangeville hospital with a fractured skull, as a result of the cutter he was driving in being struck by an automobile at the intersection of the Melancthon station sidroad and Provincial Highway No. 10.

John Longheed, of Southampton, faced two charges in the justice court on Wednesday afternoon. The first being for selling liquor at ship of Nettawasago on November 26th, and the second for selling liquor to minors. He was convicted on both charges and sentenced to six months in the County Jail on the first and three months on the second. The magistrate pointing out that his offence was greatly aggravated from the fact the liquor was sold to young boys. The boys implicated were each fined \$10 and costs after pleading guilty to being intoxicated in a public place. -Cremore Star.

Mr. J. J. Buchanan, Reeve of Colborne township, whose fine brick residence was recently at the site of his making preparations to build a new one, was injured in the house fire on Friday evening last. He was badly burned and the loss of a temporary home for the work was done voluntarily as a mark of respect in which Mr. Buchanan is held by his fellow-farmers of Colborne township. The walls of the old house are now being torn down with the expectation that enough brick will be found to rebuild the home. -Thornbury Review-Herald.
