An enthusiastic meeting of the Feversham school section was held in the school on Tuesday afternoon and it was decided by a vote of 53 for and 7 against to build an addition to the present school house in order to have a high school in the Township of Osprey. Mr. H. W. Kernahan explained the situation and gave the meeting the cost of the building and the receipts to be obtained. Mr. John Wilson of Collingwood is the architect and drew the plans for the addition. It is stated that Mr. D. L. Weber of Kimberley has been awarded the contract, the building to cost \$4,500 and with the heating plant and incidentals the cost will amount to approximately \$5,350. The need of a high school in Osprey Township has been felt for some time and it is a credit to the ratepayers and trustees of the Feversham section that they have taken the matter into their own hands.—Flesherton Advance.
