Chesley Doctors Fined

When Editor of the Chesley Enterprise started to blame the electricians for plugging booze in the path of Charles Shevell and pushing him to stumble and fall into the Walkerton jail, he little knew what sinking said he was building his superstructure.
Under the old O.T.A. which the Chesley scribe still reveres, the doctors could have prescribed a six-ounce bottle with impunity and if they thought fit, have increased the supply to a quart and got away with it. But under the new Act, doctors can no longer issue prescriptions for whiskey or dispense booze in any quantity, or blame for Shevell's condition, the actually voted away any privilege a doctor may have had in this regard.
And when Shevell went on going booze for himself, sprang the story about his wife heading the party, the two Chesley medical men passed him a six-ounce bottle, which without first seeing or examining the patient to make sure that he could safely take such a concoction, not only broke the booze control to our way of thinking didn't by their staff in any too professional manner so to speak. That one of them should have furnished help with a second bottle, because he had turned shortly after and said he had accidentally broken the first, shows a stupidity that is almost too incredible for such a wicked world. He should have got three bottles, not by the sanction of the voters, but by the gross violation of the physician's law.
No wonder Magistrate Walker ordered those Chesley doctors pleading guilty on Saturday last, imposed a fine of \$100 and costs each, without any detectable sympathy in his voice. His tremor which would suggest that he rained him badly to take their money.
