The Annual Meeting of Chatsworth Live Stock Association was held last Thursday in the Town Hall, Chatsworth. A large number from the different parts of the district were present to hear a splendid address by Mr. Chas. Zimman, of the United Farmers' Association, on Dept. of Toronto.

The inhabitants of the village are feeling the improvement in business since the opening of Mr. Taylor's chopping mill which is working all day to capacity. We are sorry we have not more industries such as this. These are the things that help a town or village and Mr. Taylor deserves all the help and sympathy that the village can give him. Boost, don't knock, and you will feel better.

It was with deep regret we read the announcement of the death of Sheriff Wilson. Our readers will remember him quite well as only a short time since he swayed a couple of days in the village dispensing of several hundred bids for planting in the flower gardens of the village and surrounding district. This, along with many other kind acts for the beauty and advancement of humanity, was his great hobby, not always thinking of himself, but giving his best for his friends and neighbours. Sheriff Wilson will be sadly missed by his many friends in Chatsworth and community.

"A square deal" is all the local gas sellers ask from Mr. Henry, of the Dept. of Highways. We have five dealers selling gas here, whose pumps are situated at the curb of the roadway through which the Provincial Highway passes, who have to pay a yearly rental of \$25.00 each for having their pumps so situated. Why should those on the Highway pay such an exorbitant rental when hundreds and thousands of gas pump owners all over the Province do not pay one cent for the privilege, simply because they are not on the Highway? If this is British fair play we cannot see it. These pumps are a convenience to the travelling public and not a menace. How would Mr. Henry like on some dark night, while travelling in his motor on the Highway to have to drive in some side road to fill up with gas instead of pulling to the curb right at his hand and be served by a courteous and obliging gas seller who is on the job all hours of the day and often part of the night? We are not insinuating that pumps of the Highway should pay such a rental, or any rental. We think it is absolutely unfair to charge a rental at all, and more especially when persons operating pumps pay their full share (and often more) of the taxes into the Municipality in which they reside. Let all parties operating gas pumps on the Highway join hands and send a deputation to see Mr. Henry and explain the situation and ask for fair play only.

Mr. Jno. Black had the misfortune to have one of his heavy horses rendered almost useless one day last week while hauling logs to Owen Sound. In some inconceivable way the sleigh and logs skidded into the ditch and upset, plunging one of the horses under the load. It took two teams to lift the load off the horse, and Mr. Black has been at quite a loss, not having used the horse since the accident. Right here we might say that the City Father of Owen Sound could improve the road on the Line Kilm Hill, which is dangerous at the best of times and very dangerous for farmers drawing loads to the market or to the factories. The use in the ditch on the East side of the road, covered with good gravel, would allow a drive-way for sleighs and wagons and would leave the full width of the present road for motor traffic at very little expense to the town.

Village Council Practices Economy?
Chatsworth Council have posted notices asking for applications for the positions of Clerk, Secy, Hydro, Assessor and Auditors, and in each case the remuneration is increased. On the street, and at Nominating meetings in the past, the remark was frequently made that the salaries for these offices was quite sufficient. In fact many people were of the opinion that the Clerical work in connection with the Hydro could be done for much less. In view of this why did the Council not ask for applications at the old salaries instead of raising them over one hundred dollars. Surely some one who thought these officials were well paid would have applied for the positions at the old prices.
