Her maiden name was Catherine Doyle and she was born in Paris, Ontario, seventy-five years ago, where members of the family still live. At the age of eighteen she was most happily wedded to Mr. O'Neil, who brought his bride to the old home on the 4th con. at the Township Hall's corner, where for 54 years she lived until moving three years ago to the fine brick home, formerly owned by Mr. John McVicker, now, the property of her son, Alfred, by industry untiring, by splendid management and foresight they prospered, erected a fine home with attractive surroundings and became leaders in church life, social activities and the life of the community. We can readily recall in the bygone days of the monster picnics held at the Irish Lake, when the deceased by her "unfailing courtesy, thoughtfulness, and self enthusiasm was largely responsible for their success.






