Origin of Term "Orange Pekoe"

This was soon Anglicized to the term we now have—Orange Pekoe, which should be pronounced "Pekoo."

"The ordinary buyer of tea, when asking for "Orange Pekoe" expects to receive a Ceylon or India Black Tea. However, there are so many qualities of "Orange Pekoe" offered to the public, that it is frequently at bargain prices, that a word of warning is necessary.

Moaning Fog-horn Disturbs Victoria

from Aid to Navigation

Ottawa—Distressed by the mounting noise of the fog-horn at Gullieside, where a steel pier sheltered by the jagged rocks, bores across the waters in thick weather, the harassed citizens of Nanaimo, B.C., have now cause to hope that their representations to the Government for the removal of what Mayor Busby has characterized as an intolerable public nuisance" may not be frutile.

"Fog-horns sounding like a man and his dog" there was now disturbance but elegant speakers termed Nanaimo's fog-bell as a protest against those last week.



Power Tube Improves Multi-Tube Receivers

A power tube should always be used in the latest audio stage of a multi-tube receiver. If more than one stage of audio amplification is employed, the receiver is required to deliver only moderate volume, i.e. CN-12-type of tube is the proper one. For greatest volume and best fog-horn quality, CN-211 or the CN-210 should be used. One disadvantage of the latter two power tubes lies in their comparatively high plate current consumption, but where "B" type eliminators are used this is not a drawback.

Power tubes require higher "B" voltages than the other tubes and "B" voltages for each other in a receiver-unit for that reason separate "B" and "C" connections are provided. In older receivers this provision may not have been made. For such cases special adaptors or "dummy bases" as they are called, may be obtained which permit power tubes to be used in these old receivers. If a unit is available which permits power tubes to be used in these old receivers, and I have a supply on hand and take them occasionally if I am not using quite well, I often recommend them to others, and cannot praise them enough for restoring my hearing.

Many Sports Known By Number of Players

To the occasional reader of sporting events the numerical term used in headlines for the names of sports teams is often confusing, and at times causes him to go on to the opening paragraph of the story to discover what kind of game has been played. But to the regular reader of sports news the numerical term is a familiar and accepted part of sports terminology.

Name your game and nine times out of ten the follower of sports will give you the numerical synonym for it. A basketball team, in which there are five positions, is a five or a quintet. A football team, however, it has eleven positions, is an eleven, a baseball team a nine; a hockey, a six or sextet; an outdoor polo team, a four or quartet; an indoor polo team, a three or a trio; and a crew is an eight.

In other sports, in which the number of positions is not standardized, the numerical term cannot be employed, but there is always some sort of synonym to take its place. Members of a wrestling team, because they compete on mats, are called matmen, or sometimes apes called grapplers. Swimmers are matmen, fencers are swordsmen, and a member of a rifle team is a marksman.

Frequently, too, the name of the game on which the game is played is used as a means to convey the real name of the sport. The most common terms in this division are: Diamond for baseball, gridiron for football, ice for hockey, court for basketball, tennis, squash, and squash racquets; pool for swimmers, water polo and under path for outdoor track.

Whole Town Radio Fans

Place in Iowa Passes Ordinance to Prevent Radio Interference

Out in the little college town of Fairfield, in Iowa, the wheels of progress must not interfere with radio reception between the hours of 12 noon and 12 midnight, according to the text of an ordinance passed by the city authorities, just received by the Federal Radio Commission.

The ordinance limits the use of electrical devices, such as washing machines, vacuum cleaners, etc., which cause interference with radio reception only, during the morning hours.

The city law was passed after the authorities had received protests from radio owners, who complained that household's devices driven by electricity, had completely disrupted choice programs in afternoons and evenings.

A fine of \$100 or thirty days in jail has been set as the alternative punishment for violation of the ordinance, the text of which said:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any instrument device or machine of any kind whatsoever, the operation of which shall cause electrical interference with radio reception, within the city limits of the city of Fairfield, Iowa, between 12 hours of 12 o'clock noon and 12 o'clock mid-night on any day after the taking effect of this ordinance, save and excepting only such as may be necessary in making X-ray pictures or examinations in emergency cases of physical injuries."

By the costly laboratory method only 10 to 15 per cent. of the carbonic acid gas would condense into snow, but in the last few years it has been found to obtain 30 per cent. or more in condensation. As a result the snow is now manufactured on a commercial scale and tons of it are made and used every day.

By means of refrigeration scarcely dreams of before.

By means of it ice-cream is now conveniently shipped from New York to Cuba and fresh sea food is sent to the West. A fish shipment to Detroit which would require 17,000 pounds of water ice, with two or more stops on the way for re-freezing, takes only 1,200 pounds of solid carbon dioxide. There is a deterioration to rolling stock or product, since there is no moisture or brine, and the acid released by evaporation serves only to drive out the oxygen and prevent decay. Five gallons of ice cream packed with the new refrigerator weighs one-third of what it would if packed in the usual way. It has been used to send butter, cheese, eggs and confections in small parcels by mail or express; in ship refrigeration to avoid the high cost of installation of refrigeration plans; in excavation work to avoid the cost of installing ice making machines and brine coils for freezing quicksand.

The reduction of the substance by evaporation is about 10 per cent. in twenty-four hours when properly stored. The carbon dioxide gas given off being heavier than air, forms a sort of insulating blanket, keeping the ice cold. When certain conditions this refrigerant is said to be fifty-four times as efficient as water ice. Its temperature is from 110 to 114 degrees below zero.

Carbon dioxide has long been indispensable at the soda fountain. Obtained from gas, produced when coke is burned under certain conditions, it is purified and liquefied under pressure, then put up in cylinders for soda fountain use and other purposes.

This liquid, cooled, is allowed to expand, and when a fixed quantity of the solid has thus been formed it is scraped into molds and compressed into twenty-pound blocks, which are sawed by the packers of various commodities into the sizes desired.
