Late Mrs. Ramage Buried on Friday

Deceased, Born in Scotland, Was Pioneer of Chatsworth District

Another one of the pioneer of the district, a highly respected resident of Chatsworth, passed away on Wednesday, February 1st, in the person of Mrs. Matthew Ramage, who had been in failing health for several months. The late Mrs. Ramage was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Inglis, and was the last surviving member of the Inglis family, three sisters having predeceased her several years ago. She was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, in 1850, and came to Canada with her father and sisters when only 7 years of age. The family settled first at Milton, Ont., later moving to the homestead near Walters Falls, where she was married in 1869 to Mr. Alan Findlay, who died in 1897. To them were born a family of ten children, nine of whom are still living and were present at the funeral on Friday. They are, as follows: George of Owen Sound; Jane of Chatsworth; John of Kenton, Man.; Mrs. Roger Milson of Chatsworth; Mrs. Jas. Fleming of Kelloe, Man.; Mrs. Elwood Long, Annan; Allan of Chatsworth; Thos. of Fiesherion, and Mrs. J. Moffat of Annan. One son, William, died in 1898.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

On motion of Messrs. Norton and McColeman G. W. Collins was appointed as Village Clerk at \$100.00 per year and statutory allowances, and Secretary of the Hydro System at \$200.00 per year.

R. W. Galbraith was appointed Assessor at \$20.00 and postage.

McColeman - Bye—That A. E. Colgan & Son be awarded contract for Village printing for 1928 at \$72.00.—Carried.

Collins - McColeman—That a grant of \$25.00 be made to the Public Library.—Carried.

Bye - Norton—That the following accounts be passed and paid: S. H. Bresse, telephone and postage, 45 cents.—Carried.

Norton - McColeman—That the application of F. C. Stafford for the office of Auditor be accepted and that we advertise for another auditor.—Carried.

Collins - Bye—That we order 25 dog tags, No. 111.—Carried.

McColeman - Norton—That leave be granted to introduce By-laws as follows: No. 1, to appoint a Clerk for the Village and Secretary for the Hydro System; No. 2, to appoint an Assessor.—Carried. Leave granted, by-laws introduced and read a first time.

Better Seed Train To Tour Grey County

The Ontario Government's Seed Cleaning Demonstration train for 1928 will tour Grey County from Friday, March 16th, to Saturday, Mar. 22nd. The most approved hower and seed cleaning machines will be in operation daily on this train, and practical demonstrations in the use of proper screens will be given by qualified men in charge. A limited quantity of grain and seeds will be thoroughly cleaned and graded at each point. Lectures will be delivered by experts each day at 2:30 p.m. on diseases of different farm crops and insect pests, destruction of weeds and all other phases of farm work, etc. Information will also be given to the source of pure seed grain and samples of selected varieties of farm crops will be shown. The train will stop from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day at the following points in Grey County.
