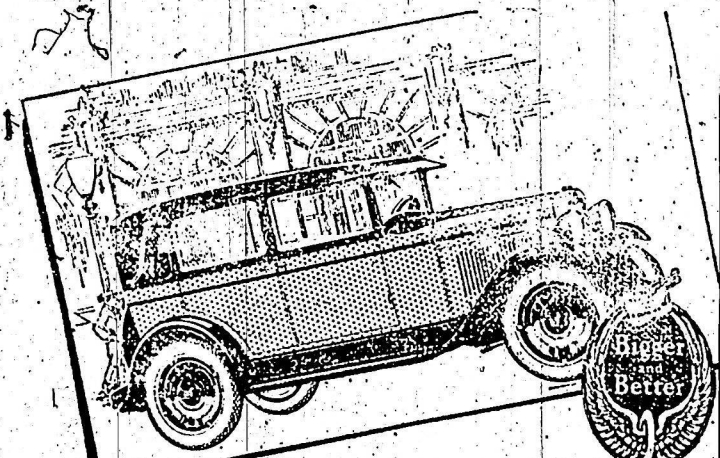

A Pioneer of Euphrasia

Thomas Nelson

There passed away at his home on the fifth line, Euphrasia, on Monday, March 12th, 1928, one of the oldest residents of this locality in the person of Mr. Thomas Nelson, aged 93 years. The deceased had been in failing health for some time, but had been a remarkably healthy man for his age.

The late Mr. Nelson was born in Ireland and came to Canada with his wife seventy years ago and settled in Euphrasia. His wife passed away a number of years ago and he is survived by one son, James, and one daughter, Miss Jennie, with whom he resided. He was a splendid type of man, honest and upright in all his dealings and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. The funeral takes place to-day (Wednesday) to Ebenezer Church (Townline) cemetery.

Funeral of the Late George Hartley

The funeral of the late George Hartley, who passed away suddenly on Tuesday of last week, took place on Thursday afternoon. Service was conducted in the Christ Church by Rev. A. S. Mitchell. The choir, of which the deceased had been a member for some years, assisted in the service. There was a large turnout of the citizens to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed and to show their sympathy for the bereaved. The remains were deposited in the chapel at the cemetery to await burial in the spring. The pallbearers were Councillors Wm. Foster, A. W. Sproule, Elmer Tuck and A. E. Colgan, Village Constable Johnston and Mr. Ran Bradey, one of the Warden of Christ Church.

Among the floral offerings, which were beautiful, were wreaths from the Village of Markdale, Bank of Montreal, Bank of Montreal staff, Christ Church, Christ Church choir, the family, and a spray from the grandchild. Mr. and Mrs. Norman Hartley and children of Maple, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Stewart of Owen Sound and Mr. and Mrs. Garry Irwin and children of Glenora were present at the funeral. Besides Mrs. Hartley, one son, Norman, and one daughter, Mrs. Garry Irwin, there are four sisters and one brother living in Yorkshire, England.

Funeral of the Late Andrew S. Irving

The funeral of the late Andrew S. Irving to whose passing we referred last week, took place from the home of Mr. James L. Irving, East Backdale Cemetery, on Friday. The service at this place conducted the services at the house and in the chapel at the cemetery. The pallbearers were: Messrs. John Eagles, Chas. Gilchrist, Wm. Hill, Wm. Stoddart, Fred. Russell and Aaron Porter. The flowers placed on the casket included a wreath from the family; sprays from Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Shaw of Owen Sound, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Boyce, and a pillow from Mr. and Mrs. Jas. L. Irving and sons. Among those here for the funeral were: Mr. and Mrs. M. Campbell of Rainy River; John Irving of Winnipeg, and Mr. Daniel White of Toronto.

Dr. Samuel Huff Dead

Dr. Sam. Huff, late Public School Inspector for East Grey, died at his home in Meaford on Friday evening, following a stroke of paralysis, which he suffered that morning. He had been ailing since the first of the New Year, but his illness was not thought to be of a serious nature.

The deceased was born near Lefroy in Simcoe County, where he lived with his parents until he started to do for himself. By hard work and diligent study he prepared himself for the teaching profession, and taught public schools at Lefroy, Belle Ewart, Orillia and Barrie. After securing his diploma as a graduate of Queen's University, Kingston, he came to Meaford from Orillia in 1891, where he accepted an appointment as science teacher in the High School, which position he held for 14 years. In 1902, he obtained the degree of Doctor of Pedagogy, he being the only man in Ontario who ever won so distinguished an honor at his age. In 1905, the deceased was appointed Public School Inspector for East Grey, holding the position until his retirement and superannuation at the end of the year. Dr. Huff was a member of the Meaford Masonic Lodge and an Orangeman. In religion he was an Anglican.

Ed. Best Died After Illness of Four Years

One of the most popular young men of this community was lost to Euphrasia and district on Thursday last, in the passing away of Mr. Edwin Best. The late Mr. Best, who died at his home here, has been in failing health for the past four years, having been an invalid for two years. His death came very suddenly and unexpectedly at the last.

The funeral took place from his home on Saturday afternoon at 2.30 p.m. to St. John's United Church where the pastor, Rev. Mr. Harrower, preached an impressive and comforting sermon to the bereaved family and friends. During the service the choir sang a beautiful anthem, the solo part being taken by Dr. Murray. Interment took place in Euphrasia cemetery, when a large concourse of friends followed the remains to their last resting place to pay their respects to one who was loved by all with whom he had come in contact. The service at the grave was conducted by Euphrasia L.O.L., of which deceased was a member.—Euphrasia Advance.

John O'Brien Died in the West, Aged 91

Mr. John O'Brien, formerly a resident of the third line Euphrasia, died at the home of his son, at Khe-dive, Sask., on Friday, February 24th at the great age of 91 years.

Mr. O'Brien was born in King Township on January 21, 1837. He moved with his parents to Artemesia Township in the year 1850, being among the very early settlers. In 1859 Mr. O'Brien was married to Miss Sarah Lowe. They went to Michigan but returned in 1876 and settled on the third concession of Euphrasia, bordering on the town-line, Artemesia and Euphrasia. In 1906 the family moved to Saskatchewan and homesteaded the land where the deceased gentleman passed away. Mrs. O'Brien pre-deceased him in 1910, four years after going west. He is survived by two sons, W. H. and J. T. O'Brien, both of Khe-dive, Sask. The deceased gentleman was a man of strict integrity. The sons have the sympathy of the many old friends here, in the loss of a kind and wise father.—Euphrasia Advance.
