In 1902, he obtained, the degree of Doctor of Pedagogy, he being the only man in Ontario who ever won so distinguished an honor at his age. In 1905, the deceased was appointed Public School Inspector for East Grey, holding the position until his retirement and superannuation at the end of the year.
