Simon Philip Embury

On Thursday, March 29, Simon Philip Embury was called to his reward and on the Saturday following his body was laid away in Markdale Cemetery. In his declining years Mr. Embury was cared for by Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Burritt, the latter of whom was sister to the late Mrs. Embury. A large number of friends and neighbors attended the funeral which was conducted by Rev. A. Newton St. John, One brother, Albert, survives living in Quebec. A sister, Mrs. Mills, passed away at Christmas time.


