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Former Chatsworth Resident Dies in the West

Word has been received here of the death of Mrs. Harold A. Brown of Drumheller, Alberta, from heart failure on Friday, April 20th. The deceased had been in indifferent health for some months but her condition was not considered serious and the news of her death was a severe shock to her friends. Mr. Brown had gone but ten days before on a holiday trip to Cardiff, Wales, where his aged parents reside.

The late Mrs. Brown, whose maiden name was Agnes Pauline Partridge, was a daughter of Mr. John and the late Mrs. Partridge who were highly esteemed residents here for a number of years. She was born here and attended Public School during her childhood and went west with the family about twenty-five years ago. While living here she became a member of the Presbyterian Church and continued active in Church work until the time of her death.

The deceased is survived by her husband, her father, Mr. John Partridge of High River, Alberta, two brothers and four sisters, namely: Fred, Mrs. King and Mrs. Boyd of Calgary; Mrs. R. J. Morrison of High River; and Mrs. Harry Nelson of Vulcan, Alberta.

Funeral services were conducted at Drumheller on Sunday, after which the remains were forwarded to High River. Impressive funeral services were conducted at Chalmers Church on Tuesday afternoon, the church being filled with relatives and friends of the deceased. Rev. Mr. Rennie conducted the services and Rev. Mr. Dalgleish paid tribute to the splendid qualities of the deceased who was an active member of his church at High River. The pallbearers were Messrs. Alex. Thompson, G. Parker, V. C. Stanley, P. Black, A. Mack and H. M. Cascaaden.

Many former associates of the late Mrs. Brown still reside in this locality and all will sympathize with the relatives in their bereavement.

Former Chatsworth Minister Goes to Waterloo

Rev. Finlay Matheson, B.A., a former pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church here has accepted a call to the pastorate of one of the most important churches in Western Ontario. He has been in Stratford for the past fifteen years, and in referring to the matter the Kitchener-Waterloo Daily Record has this to say: "Rev. Finlay Matheson, B.A., who has accepted the call to the pastorate of First United Church, Waterloo, succeeding Rev. J. O. Watts, is well and favorably known throughout Western Ontario. He is one of a trio of brothers in the service of the church, the others being Professor John Matheson of Queen's University and Dr. Hugh Matheson, Librarian at Knox College, Toronto. The pastor-elect has an enviable record of successful ministry in Chatsworth, Embro, St. Andrew's church, Stratford, and in his present charge, the newly formed Parkview congregation in the same city."

Of Highland Scotch parentage, Rev. Matheson possesses the warm heartedness, characteristic of his people, and so acceptable in a minister of the gospel. For many years he has occupied the role of clerk of the Presbytery of Perth and brother ministers in the Presbytery speak highly of his abilities.

It is expected that Rev. Finlay Matheson and Mrs. Matheson will take up their work in Waterloo at the beginning of July. Mrs. Matheson is also an ardent church worker, and recently was elected president of the Stratford branch of the Local Council of Women.

Rev. J. O. Watts, the present pastor, announced his intention of moving from Waterloo about this time of year as early as January. As a result of his decision a committee of six, with M. S. Hallman as chairman, was appointed to fill the vacancy which would be created in the local pastorate. A recommendation that Mr. Finlay Matheson be extended a call to assume pastoral duties in the local congregation, was submitted to the congregation at the annual meeting on Wednesday evening and was unanimously endorsed. At that time a hearty vote of thanks for the work he has done in Waterloo and an expression of regret at his decision to move, were extended to Mr. Watts.

Horticultural Society Notes

The executive of the Horticultural Society met on the evening of the 20th ult. to receive reports from the conveners of the Memorial Park, Village Improvements, and Prize List Committees. Rev. S. Martin as convener submitted his report on behalf of the Village Improvement Committee. Mr. Allan Finlay presented a tentative prize list for the Annual Flower and Vegetable Show, and Miss Wilson for Mr. S. H. Breesse indicated the improvements the committee will carry out in the Memorial Park.

The reports as given by Rev. Mr. Martin, Mr. Finlay and Miss Wilson represented considerable work done and showed that the various committees certainly had not been remiss in their duty. For instance, Mr. Martin's report included the planting of trees along Campbell Street or McNabb Street as we understand the correct name is, the ploughing and leveling of the ground around the Hydro Station in preparation for the planting of shrubs and flowers, the planting of flowers at the junction of the Toronto Line and the Main Street of the village opposite Mr. Howard Walker's Service Station, the planting of flower beds at the junction of the Toronto Line and McNabb Street, also the preparation of certain vacant lots for the planting of Fall bulbs.

Mr. Allan Finlay submitted a very exhaustive and carefully drawn-up Prize List for the Annual Show, including house plants, garden flowers and vegetables, the value of the prizetakers adding up just about one hundred dollars. It may be said here that the executive and directors of the Society intend to make the Annual Flower and Vegetable Show an outstanding event in the life of the community during the summer months. It is confidently felt that once the public sees the Flower and Vegetable Show that the success and permanence of the Society will be established, and that many who have not become members so far, will be glad to join. The Show coming towards the end of August will not interfere with any other established activity, and will both provide something well worth while for the citizens to look forward to and an event of pleasure and delight to take part in. At this early date we can all picture something of the display of flowers and plants in our mind, the pansies, sweet-peas, roses, gladioli, phlox, dahlias, asters, collection and decorations of different kinds.

The committee confidently feel that once the public has seen and taken part in the first annual show, the membership of the Society will rapidly increase to at least two hundred and fifty or three hundred members. Those intending to join might be reminded again that unless they join soon it will be impossible for them to receive their premium this Spring, and will have to take it in Fall bulbs.

Miss Wilson placed a large order of roses, Japanese barbery, and peonies for the Memorial Park. It is felt that the trees planted so far in the park are all right, but that the park lacks color to make it attractive and pleasing to the eye. No doubt next year the Memorial Park will be quite an attractive place and people will be found going there to enjoy the beauty of its flowers and well-kept walks. Amongst other things the committee have in mind the erection, when possible of a rustic inn towards the back of the slopes of the hill, to provide rest and shade for those who would like to spend an hour or two in "the great out-of-doors."

The secretary might add that tickets are now on order bearing the name of the society, these will be distributed among the executive and directors and may be had from them at any time by those desiring to join.
