The people here were shocked to hear of the untimely death of Mr. Robert John Pedlar at the age of 52 years. Mr. Pedlar was suddenly seized by pneumonia on Wednesday, April 25, and was taken to Lindsay Hospital where he received good treatment but efforts were in vain to save his life from the fatal disease and death claimed him on Monday night. Last fall he with his daughter and family moved to Oakwood to reside. For a number of years previous to this he was a steady employee at the Durham Furniture Factory Mill at Rock Mills.
