Chatsworth, May 7/28  
Council met Monday evening at 8 p.m., all members present.  
Mr. R. W. Crane asked for use of Town Hall for meeting of the Educational Association of North Grey. This request was granted.  
Rev. J. Graham asked Council for grant on behalf of the Horticultural Society. A grant of \$25.00 was given.  
The citizens of the village are requested to clean their yards and have rubbish placed in boxes and left at side of street so that it may be removed to the dumping ground.  
Mr. Thos. Collins was appointed a Park Committee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. E. O. Merriam.  
The resignation of G. W. Collins was accepted and the Council will advertise for separate applications for Village Clerk and Hydro Secretary. Salary for Clerk one hundred dollars and statutory allowance and two hundred for Hydro Secretary per annum. Separate sealed applications for each office will be received by S. H. Breese, Reeve, up to June 4th.  
The usual number of bills were passed and paid.  
The Assessor's Roll was accepted and Court of Revision will be held on Monday, May 28th, at 10 o'clock a.m.  
A petition was presented to the Council with a request that they protest against the establishment of a Brewer's Warehouse in the Village.  
The Council passed a resolution protesting against the establishing of a Brewer's Warehouse in the Village of Chatsworth and forward same to Mr. F. Oliver, the local member, for presentation to the Liquor Control Board.  
Council adjourned to meet again Monday, June 4th.

## Horticultural Society Notes

A very fine meeting of the Executive and Directors of the Horticultural Society was held in the Town Hall on Wednesday evening last, there being fifteen present and a good deal of important work carried through. The Annual Flower and Vegetable Show and the Prize List for the same claimed considerable time and attention.

The Prize List was accepted almost as submitted by the committee, only a few minor changes being made. After the committee appointed to solicit donations of prizes from the merchants and others interested in flowers and shrubs and who might care to encourage the growing of some particular flower or shrub, have completed their work, the Prize List will be printed and mailed, together with the membership ticket, to all members of the society as soon as ever possible. Those receiving a copy of the Prize List are asked to keep it carefully by them, as only items they will eventually decide to compete in at the show. The Prize List is being printed and forwarded to the members now, so that everyone will know just what items comprise the list, and that they may be in a position to prepare for the show from now on. Members will please keep the copy sent them, as only a limited number is being printed.

It was decided to hold the First Annual Show in the Agricultural building and on Wednesday, the 22nd of August. Judging will take place during the morning and the Show will be open to the public during the afternoon and evening. It will not be necessary to give here the rules and regulations governing the Show as all rules and regulations pertaining to it will be printed on the inside page of the Prize List. It was decided amongst many other things that for this year the Executive and Directors have full charge of the Show. This after all is as it should be since the Executive and Directors intend to make the Show an outstanding event in the life of the community. Some reference may be made here to one of the outstanding events, namely, the Children's parade of doll-carriages, kiddy-cars, wagons, etc., decorated with flowers of almost every kind. The children taking part in the parade will probably gather at the Town Hall from where they will wend their way to the Agricultural building, the judging will probably be done on the way to the building and the names of the winners announced on arrival there. All children under ten years of age on the day of the Show, both boys and girls, will be eligible to compete, irrespective of whether their parents are members of the society or not, and whether they live in the country or not. The aim of the Society is to give all children under ten years of age some part in the Annual Show, and this is an event that will undoubtedly draw a large number of spectators from far and near. Fuller details will be given later.

The first consignment of stock has arrived and has been already delivered. It is expected that the bulk of the stock on order will arrive at almost any time, when notice will be given immediately by the officers to all concerned.

Without any effort having been made to secure members, the society has now a membership of seventy-two. Come along and join a society that exists wholly for the benefit of the community. You will enjoy the comradeship of those who have already joined, and you will most likely learn something about flowers of different kinds that will do you good. Join now and have no regrets at Flower Show time on the 22nd of August, wishing then that you had joined sooner.

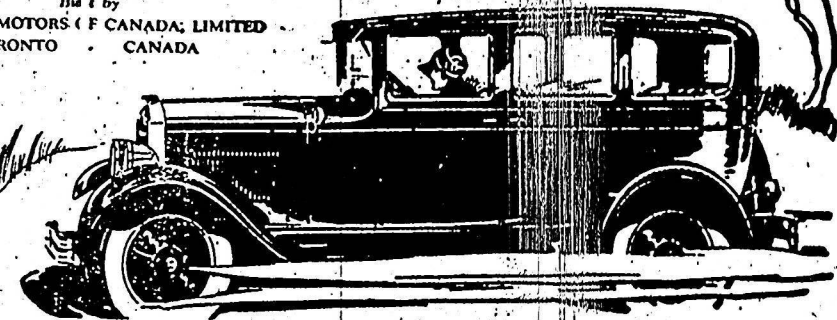
