Judge Warner at Christ Church

Christ Church was crowded to the doors on Sunday evening to hear the final address and to bid farewell to Rev. G. Quinton Warner who has been conducting a week's mission in the parish. Mr. Warner's method of conducting a revival was new to a great many. From first to last sensationalism was taboo. While, doubtless a lot of bill-board publicity would have gathered unusual crowds, no such attempt was made. As a result the meetings were essentially very thoughtful and gradually increased in interest. There was no appeal for signatures or public resolutions, but the big congregations waiting patiently at the end to grasp the hand of the Missioner were eloquent testimony for the greatness of their appreciation. Mr. Warner, with his wealth of experience, had a sane and quiet approach to his subject, and his addresses were of a most constructive character. His humble and respectful attitude towards the earnest souls of people who were concerned that is sometimes lacking with men who adopt the more ostentatious and violent methods of some evangelists. His very real and sympathetic understanding of the problems of the people revealed, not in seething condemnation, but in a loving sympathy that makes hearers think of the Great Comforter of Love and Peace. It was a privilege indeed to attend the meetings and all who did so felt a new thrill in tackling the problems of life and chiefly the personal task of developing the full image of Christ. There was a certain Holy Communion each morning at which special prayers of intercession were offered. In the afternoon there was an instruction and in the evening a course of meetings on the 22nd Psalm. The whole mission was most steady, and we heard from all sides and from all churches words of appreciation of this very gifted man whose motto seems to be "he that loseth his life shall find it."

Howey and Atkinson said that they would both be candidates for the Council in case an election was to be held. Councillors Heighes and Price were called and the former responded.

Ex-Reeve Colgan of Markdale was called to the platform and responded by complimenting the township on its splendid financial condition.

The meeting was closed by singing the National Anthem.
