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

For Deputy Reeve: Ronald Comber.

For Councillors: James Howey and Jos. S. Atkinson.

On motion Mr. Hart was asked to take the chair while the several candidates addressed the electors. Ex-Reeve Gardner was first called and gave an explanation as to why he had withdrawn.

Mr. Stewart announced himself as a candidate for the Reevship and Mr. Acheson, who was not present, has since qualified. Mr. Comber, who is Deputy Reeve by proclamation, thanked the electors for the honor which had been bestowed on him and promised to give his best services to the township. Messrs. Howey and Atkinson said that they would both be candidates for the Council in case an election was to be held. Councillors Heighes and Price were called and the former re-spoke.

Ex-Reeve Colson of Markdale was called to the platform and responded by complimenting the township on its splendid financial condition.

The meeting was closed by singing the National Anthem.

The election will take place on Friday next, when the following names will appear on the ballot:

For Councillors: Joseph S. Atkinson and James Howey.
