## Fortune Left to Rival's Heirs

Romance of Two Men Who Loved the Same Girl—Remorse Brings Reparation in Last Will of Survivor

### DUEL'S FATAL ENDING

Budapest.—"May the Almighty forgive me for the crime I have committed by killing my friend, I am anxious to make some form of reparation, and therefore decided that in this, my last will and testament, all my property shall be bequeathed to the children of my rival . . ."

These words provided the happy ending a few days ago of one of the most moving triangular dramas that had ever been heard in the Hungarian law courts. Here a law suit involving the will of the late Benno Gaffy, a rich landowner and member of the Hungarian aristocracy, has been dragging on for eight years.

Gaffy left his entire property to the two children of Count Hermann Aurenberg, whom he had killed in a duel, thus disinheriting his own two children, who contested the will, and thus a romance of the two families came to light.

### SECRET HOPES.

Gaffy and Aurenberg were great friends in their youth. While they were at the university they lived together, and spent their holidays together. Both fell in love with the same girl, and, although their friendship was broken by moments of jealousy and bitterness, they each nourished secret hopes of being the favorite.

Court Aurenberg, however, was the fortunate one, and married the girl. From that time Gaffy avoided his friend, refused his attempts to remain on friendly terms, and ignored his letters.

Gaffy married, eventually, and many years passed before fate brought the two men together again. They met at the house of a mutual friend during the celebration of a silver wedding. During the course of the evening they exchanged angry words that resulted in a challenge to a duel.

The duel was fought with swords, and although Gaffy was not as good a swordsman as his former friend, he ran his blade into Aurenberg's heart. The匈牙利人 died.

Gaffy's disinherited children sought to upset the will by proving that their father's mind was unthilled by the tragic result of the duel, and he was not in his right mind when he made the will.



### Camouflage Your Hems

A simple suggestion for camouflaging hems, in a wool dress is to be found in the practical magazine, "Successful Farming." "In putting a hem in a wool dress," it reads, "there is usually an unnecessary amount of material which causes the hem line to look bulky. This is not at all desirable. I have avoided this by folding the material once to form the hem and machine stitching a piece of mercerized ribbon or tape about one-half-inch in width along the raw edge of the hem. The hem should then be pressed flat so it will remain in place and the upper edge of the ribbon or tape either catch stitched or small stitched to the dress. This insures a smooth hem which is practically invisible."
