Word has been received here of the
death at Regina, Sask., of Mr. John
Ritchie, who for the past few years
has resided at the home of his son,
near Bell's Lake. A few weeks ago,
owing to ill health, he went to Re-
gina to reside with a daughter. A
brother, George Ritchie, lives near
Durham.

A dispatch from Port Arthur to
the Mail and Empire on Monday gives
the following particulars:

John Ritchie, who died in Regina
Friday, was up until four years ago
public school inspector for Thunder
Bay district, serving in that capacity
for about 20 years after 15 years as
school principal in Fort William and
Port Arthur. He was seventy years
of age. It is claimed he held the
world's walking record for aggregate
distance in the twenty years he was
school-inspector for the district of
Thunder Bay. In a field of widely
scattered schools, he became famous
for his long distance walking day
after day and thus in the two decades
covered many thousands of miles on
foot and developed a remarkably fast
pace. Mr. Ritchie was born in Grey
County, taught in Mount Forest, Har-
rington and Cornwall.

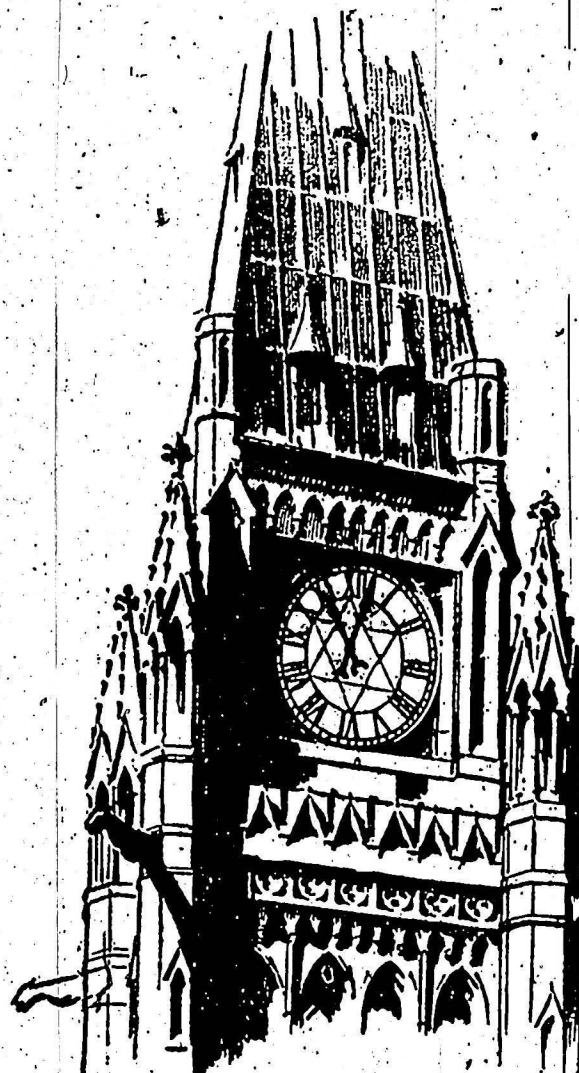
