WORLD NEWS IN BRIEF

13,000 members of the Orange Order walked in procession in Toronto on July 12th, followed by innumerable motor cars.

The Canadian Bank of Commerce has taken over the Standard Bank of Canada, the amalgamated capital amounting to \$700,000,000.

Swimmers for the great swimming contest at the Canadian National Exhibition are already in Toronto, in training in the waters of Lake Ontario.

Eaton's store is to be greatly enlarged. Buildings on the Yonge, College, Bay and Buchanan block will be wrecked to make way for the enlargement, among them the famous Bishop Strachan School for Girls, founded in 1869.

Twenty-two head of cattle belonging to Reeve Osborne of Sutton, Ont., died of poison by eating grass poisoned by a weed-extirminating solution on the right of way of the Simcoe radial line. Reeve Osborne declares he will take action against the Toronto Transportation Commission unless the yestite.

In Lethbridge, Alta., on July 18th, the Canadian Historical Society erected a cairn to commemorate the opening of the first coal mine in Alberta in 1872. The event being accompanied by fitting ceremonial and speech-making. Nicholas Sheran was the discoverer of the coal area, and in 1882 Sir Alexander Galt reorganized the Northwest Coal and Navigation Company, of which William Lethbridge was elected President.

Nine men, half of the Canadian team that went to Bisley Camp, England, were in the shooting for the King's Prize, which took place on July 14th, when the "King's Hundred" lined up for the great test. The prize was won by an Englishman, Lance-Corp. Hale of Birmingham. Lieut. Desmond Burke of Ottawa was coming second. Lieut. Burke was awarded the trophy for the winner of the Grand Aggregate, from scores taken in ten individual competitions.

By order of Sir Henry Drayton, Liquor Control Board Chairman, over \$200,000 worth of liquor was seized on July 11th at the docks of the Erie Transit Co., Windsor, a subsidiary of the Carling Brewery Co., and the Nathanson Co. Tremendous quantities of liquor had been concentrated along the borders by these two, and other companies, for export into the U.S., or to be taken back into Ontario. The companies are taking steps to recover the liquor, and will take the case into court and even carry it to the Privy Council.

Detectives of the Toronto police early last week recovered part of the \$300,000 stolen in the mail robbery at the Union Station on June 20th. Over \$4000 was found buried in two tin cans at 40 Laing St., and \$2268 under the flooring of the stair in an apartment on Royce Ave. Five men and a woman were arrested, and with renewed determination the police set out to find the "brains" of the outfit, said to be three U.S. gunmen with bad reputations. Of the four men at first arrested, three had served terms in penitentiary for stealing. The men were: a truck driver, a barber, a taxicab driver, a cigar store man, and the son of one of the men.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

Eleven deaths occurred through airplane accidents in the United States on July 13th.

A school of aircraftmanship for boys is being opened in Highgate, a suburb of London, England.

Plots against the Spanish Government have been discovered, and many arrests have been made in the cities of Spain.

William F. Varney, Rockville Centre, N.Y., was nominated by the Prohibition Party, on July 12th, as its candidate for the Presidency of the United States.

King George's youngest son, Prince George, has been appointed on H.M.S. "Durban", a cruiser on the American and West Indies station, as interpreter in French.

The three men who left the General Nobile's party, in an attempt to reach land were found on an ice floe by a Russian aviator, Chukhnouky,
