### Educational Conservation

#### Jack Miner Calls Attention to Great Wealth of Ontario's Northland and Her Lakes.

\$100 from Tourists as Good as \$100 from Wheat Shipped Out

"Game and Fish Conservation a National Asset"

"Since making the statement in a former article in the Toronto Globe that I stood for educational conservation, my mail has been deluged with requests for a full explanation, and in fifteen years I have been lecturing in more school children in New York State, to whom I have emphasized the importance of building bird houses. If I can get a child to build a bird house he will naturally care more for a pole, and that boy or girl at once becomes a conservationist. More over, he becomes a better citizen because of the love-kindled in his heart. He certainly will not kill the bird that he has made, nor is he likely to allow any other person to destroy a bird in his vicinity.

"This I call educational conservation. But we must not lose sight of the fact that we have got to have laws—and strict laws—for experience and personal observation have taught me that kindness without firmness is a total failure. And we have got to have qualified game wardens to enforce these laws. There is a small percentage—less than five percent—who are of this kind, and this small percentage of people easily can upset the majority of people.

"Too many citizens look at conservation as merely a sportsman's proposition, when the fact of the matter is it is one of Ontario's biggest assets. Between Sudbury and Port William there are thousands of square miles of territory which has been stripped of its valuable timber, and at present practically food only for mining, big game hunting and fishing. No State in the United States or Province in Canada has such a vast sportsman's paradise, and if we will take the wolves out and let the deer increase, not only by the actual money paid out for licenses, but that left in the country by tourists and hunters will give a doubtful return. Stop and think of the different places tourists leave money—railways, gas stations, hotels, stores, taxis, boat fares, rent of cottages, rents of boats, and most encouraging of all, the money he would leave with the guides and set-tees."

"I still stand for raising the bounty on wolves and at the same time raising hunters' license fees enough to meet the extra bounty paid. Get the wolves out of the country, allow deer to increase and thus bring more tourists to Ontario. We all know that \$100 brought in by tourists has just as much purchasing power as \$100 received for wheat shipped out. Let's get together and educate each other how to make our lakes worth more. It was told by one of Wisconsin's Government officials that lakes in Wisconsin and Minnesota were more valuable to these States through money brought in than the same area of cleared agricultural land, and we all know these States border on Ontario. Such being the case, what is the value of our lakes, which up to the present time are free of pollution? Think it over. Don't let us get together and talk laws. Let us get together and do something."



Yes, we poured out our hearts to each other and their conversation was based on the betterment for the rising generation, and dear readers, please pardon the quivering tone of my writing for there are tears trickling down my cheeks, right now. Just to think that my life was far the best of any one of the four of us, but to-day, I am the only survivor, the other three have passed on, and I am all alone to tell the story, and to brief, these big-hearted men grasped the situation, and arranged that I should have a donation to help me on with my old age."

"And they also arranged that I should come to Chicago and accompany them on a week-end fishing trip into Northern Wisconsin. At the appointed time, I went, they met me as agreed, and on a Saturday morning we arrived at their fishing reserve, and Jim Heyworth rowed me out and I caught the first speckled trout, and the last one I ever caught. It was morning being Sunday, I put on my rubber boots and went for a stroll up the bank of the stream above their two artificial lakes, here I saw two three occupied beaver houses and I flushed several pairs of mallards that were evidently nesting in the vicinity, and when fully one mile above the line of their reserve I went to cross the stream on an old log bridge evidently used by the settlers of that country every winter. The bridge, I should say, was about fifteen feet wide and the clear water fully three feet deep. As the sun was hot, my rubber boots were extremely warm, so I sat down on this bridge and pulled them off, and soon I was listening to the songs of the migratory birds that were flitting among the scattered trees in this swampy ravine, and I stretched out like a blacksnake and was about drifting off into dream land when the corner of my eye was attracted by a glimmer in the clear water, and now let me say to the Sportsmen of North America, that my younger days I have enjoyed seeing two different varieties of ducks in my decoys at once in Northern Quebec and Ontario, I have there and time again had a carload of moose at the mercy of my rifle—and during the last fifteen years I have seen the wild geese fly up so thick and close to my little home that the vibration of their wings was actually shook the windows, but never in my life dreamed of a thrilling life have I held such a beautiful, glittering, over-flowing beautiful sight as I did for the next hour, and I had hard work even then to break away for I am many times certain that I saw five times as many geese there as I saw in any stream as this whole lake country, but before leaving I took particular notice and here was a public fisherman's path beside this trout stream.

"Now you see the cause of these speckled beaver glittering their way up and up—and up—and up—and up—certainly the very same cause of my sacrificing them that paid my way and were the cause of me being there to see them.

God tells us in his word "that a good man leaveth an inheritance to his children." Who will doubt this blessed promise, when we think of our beloved Will Dill, the founder of our Inaak Welfare League. Bless his dear memory, he left a heritage to a wasteful nation, for the overflow of his life was the I.W.O.A. He joined us together and through us we will only be self-sacrificing enough who can support back our debt of extravagance and have the thrilling and loving enjoyment of seeing the overflow of our lives go over the top and up the streams. The same as I saw the overflow of "Pop" Stinson's, Jim Heyworth's and Charlie Folsom's going up the stream for our children's children.

Dear reader, will you be self-sacrificing enough to be absolutely certain that there is an overflow to your life that you are to follow and now in closing, I just wish to say a word to those who are nearest and dearest to these dear public spirited gentlemen, especially their wives and families. Do not think that you bow alone in your grief, for your loss is North America's loss, do not let us look upon them as gone from us forever. Not! They have just gone on ahead.

### Britons Smoke Less But Eat More Candy

#### Englishwomen, However, Are Cutting Down on Sweets and Taking to Tobacco

The trade papers of English confectionery and tobacco manufacturing show by statistics that Englishmen are eating more candy and smoking less, while their women are smoking more and eating less candy.

The cause were debated in London recently at a confectionery exhibition organized by the Manufacturing Confectioners' Alliance, held at Olympia. The situation had become serious, the head of one firm said, because "while girls had gone off sweets, the deficit in consumption has not been made up by the men. Smoking kills the taste for sweets, and sweets kills the craving for smoking. We are not interested in how soon men will return to smoking. Our problem is how to increase the consumption of sweets among women."

Another, on being asked to account for the change in the habits of the sexes, said:

"The war caused it. The manufacturing of confectionery was cut down; that of tobacco was increased. Cigarettes were plentiful everywhere. The men then made were sent to the front. In the trenches smoking was very often forbidden, but the men could cut on all occasions the millions of pounds of sweets sent over, while the women over there and at home began to smoke because they considered it more in keeping with their war work than nibbling sweets. The men brought back the habit with them, with a particular taste for caramel favors.

"You can see them chewing toffee nowdays at horse and greyhound races. When they want strength of mind—a difficult athletic, they again chew toffee. As for the office, there is many a man today who keeps a bag of sweets beside him on his desk in the city. Sweet-eating has at any rate annihilated tobacco chewing in the lower classes and snuff-taking in the upper."


