Of the States cited by this writer, the State showing the greatest percentage of farms using electricity was California, where the extensive use of electric power for irrigation pumping has simplified the difficulties of rural electrification. Even in the case of California, however, only 23 per cent. of the farms were reported as using electricity. In the other States mentioned, the percentages ranged from 7 per cont. to 2 per cent. The per cent. of farms using electricity in New York State was not even mentioned, and it seems certain that if the figure had been 33 per cent., pr even onetenth of that amount, it would not have been omitted by Professor Stewart. For the whole of the United States, Professor Stewart estimated that about 2.6 per cent. of the farms were electrified, and as this includes California and the other selected States, it seems clear that the per cent. of farms receiving electrical service in New York State must have been very small indeed.

The New York State Public Servico Commission has jurisdiction over all electrical utilities serving consumers in the State, but, in the extonsive statistical reports published by it, rural consumers are not regarded as being sufficiently numerous to justify separate classification.




